Shipping News

CANADIAN SETTLER LEAVING FOR UNITED KINGDOM

The Canadian Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Settler, Captain Robertson, came out of the drydock at Halifax Saturday morning and is now lying at Old Pier 2. She will start loading general cargo the first of the week for the United Kingdom. She has been in Halifax since the 3rd of March when she arrived with a small cargo from Glasgow including 6,000 cases of whiskey. Between four and five hundred of these were consigned to Halifax. Her arrival in Halifax completed the Settler's first voyage. She is about 5,000 tons gross.

CONTRACTS FOR TEN FRENCH SHIPS

Contracts for ten freight ships have been placed with the Canadian Shipbuilding Corporation, Three Rivers, by three different French companies. It is understood that these ships will be used as wine carrying vessels and as oil tankers. The National Shipbuilding Corporation has its head offices in the United States.

BIGGEST CATCH THIS WINTER

Over 200,000 pounds of fish were landed at Lockport on Friday last as the result of two days fishing which was by far the best catch of the winter, which has been an extremely bad one for fishermen. The shares per man ranged from \$55 to \$69.

STEAMER SCOTIA ARRIVED IN HALIFAX

The steamer Scotia arrived in Halifax Saturday morning at 2 a. m. from eastern ports and like other ships arriving was very much lee'd. The appearance of a steamer in this condition after the recent mild weather causes comment now, whereas a few weeks ago it was the normal condition of a ship arriving from sea. The Scotia was at the Dominion Coal pier Saturday afternoon taking in coal.

WHITE STAR LINE SAILINGS

The first sailing of the White Star Dominion Line from Montreal this season will be the Megantic on May 22, and a regular service will thenceforth be maintained to Liverpool by that vessel and the Canada.

As there is a heavy demand for passenger space from England at the present time arrangements have been made to have the "Baverford" of the American Line running between Liverpool and Philadelphia, to call at Halifax for the convenience of Canadian passengers.

More than 3,000 workmen are busy on board the White Star liner "Olympic" now being reconditioned at Harland and Wolff's Belfast yards prior to her return to the trans-Atlantic passenger trade between New York, Cherbourg, and Southampton. The steamer is announced to leave Southampton on June 25 and will make her first trip from New York on July 8th. The Olympic is being refitted to burn fuel oil, and electrical refitting will restore the big liner to her pre-war condition and efface all evidence of the fact that during the conflict she carried more than 200,000 persons safely across the Atlantic, and to and from the front at Gallipoli.

ICE IS STILL THICK ON RIVER ST. LAWRENCE

After a week of plunging and smashing on the ice barrier at Port Neuf the ice-breaker Lady Grey returned to Quebec Saturday afternoon.  
The ice block still holds and so far is the biggest job the ice-breaker has yet encountered.  
The ice at Sorel is still solid and a movement is not expected for a week yet. The same condition is to be found in the river outside Montreal. There is a widening of the channel however above the city just below the bridge.  
Predictions that there will be flooding this year are not borne out by the Harbour Commissioners daily record of tide level in the river and at the lock sill. The river is 2 feet lower than last year on the same date.

NO FRILLS FOR THE MEN

No gay colors, no frills, no outlandish patterns, for the men!

"Velvet collared overcoats for instance, which have been looked upon somewhat askance by our belted Heli Brummels of recent years, will be quite the in and worn much more generally than they are now. The reason is simple. If a man can afford to buy only one overcoat at present prices the one that he can wear on any and all occasions is the one he will buy."

Spends Vacation In "Seeing Canada"

ST. JOHN, March 22.—A Montreal manufacturer who was in the city on Saturday said the movement started by the Manufacturers' Association to induce people to spend their vacations in "Seeing Canada" tours was receiving strong support. The chances were a great number of Canadians from interior cities would visit the Maritime Provinces this summer.  
Many business men who have been accustomed to spend a few weeks in Florida or California during the winter have stopped home this winter," said the manufacturer. "One reason was that they did not want to discount their money; another was, no doubt, that they felt they should keep close to their jobs while conditions still showed some sign of unsettlement. These men will want a long holiday this summer, as well as others who have gone short on holidays since 1914. They will want to get near the sea coast where the breezes are cold, and they will not go to Main this summer. The trouble is very few know where to go to spend an enjoyable summer vacation in Canada."  
In this connection the following editorial from the Atlantic Leader is of interest:

"The Commercial Club of St. John is taking up a useful work in starting a campaign for the furnishing of information for tourists in the season of travel. It is thought, not unreasonably, that next summer there will be less Canadian travel in the United States because of the discount to which Canadian money is subject over the border, and that, on the other hand, American travel will set in strong for Canada because of the premium on American funds in this country. The St. John Standard quotes a Toronto magazine as publishing a story to the effect that the value of the booze landed at the port of St. John this winter would pay off one quarter of the national debt of Canada, and if this interesting information gets around in the arid cities of the United States, the scenery of this part of the world may develop an unusual lure for Uncle Sam's thirsty citizens. This phase of the tourist question was not, however, discussed by the Public Information committee of the Commercial club of the sister city. This kind of work for the public good, is admirable, and if the club in St. John keeps it up with diligence and perseverance it will have placed New Brunswick under a debt of obligation that cannot so be repaid."
