Edwin Wide To Compete In N. S.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Edwin Wide, Swedish school teacher, who ranks as Paavo Nurmi's outstanding distance running rival in Europe, plans an invasion of the United States but not until next spring and then only if he succeeds in obtaining a government scholarship for study in this country, according to The Associated Press.

These information, received through official Swedish sources recently upset plans of promoters here who figured on Wide's arrival late in the summer to participate in several outdoor carnivals, including a Knights of Columbus meet at the Yankee Stadium in September, and then in the various metropolitan indoor meets.

"I want to go to the United States very much," Wide is quoted as saying in a recent interview, "but I want to do it without being dependent on my form as a runner. I should be out of condition. I simply would refuse to run, and I should feel fit I should like to run as much as suits myself and not as a prospective manager. But by saying that I do not mean to imply a criticism of Nurmi, whose trip was made exclusively for running purposes. He stands so much in a class by himself that he should not be judged by the same standards as ordinary athletes."

Wide, who is an instructor in the public schools of Stockholm, holds all the Swedish records from 1,500 to 10,000 meters. He is 29 years old.

ley River choir, assisted by Mr. Robert Messervey. Miss Smith presided at the organ.

The ceremony opened with the singing of the National Anthem, followed by introductory remarks by the chairman, who called upon His Honor Lieutenant Governor Hearty as the first speaker.

His Honor delivered a fine stirring address, in which he laid stress on the fact that the people for whom our soldier boys had sacrificed their lives had a great debt to pay, one which could not be wiped out by the simple erection of a monument, but only by dedicating ourselves anew to the service and duty for which they had so gladly died. Ending his address amid enthusiastic applause, the Governor, after the rendition in chorus of "O God our help in ages past," descended from the platform and undraped the memorial while the assemblage sang in unison the National Anthem.

Rev. J. S. Bonnell in the course of an eloquent and inspiring address paid a strong tribute to those whose memory the monument commemorated and recounted some of the scenes that led up to and took place at the eve of the hostilities between Britain and Germany. He deplored and urged against the adoption of a cynical attitude towards the result that the struggle had on the morals and actions of civilized people.

Rev. Mr. Baxter, Hunter River, in the course of a few remarks laid emphasis on the fact that service to one's country could be rendered just as well in time of peace as in time of war. His remarks were listened to with rapt attention and received with loud applause.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan, who followed, complimented the Wheatley River monument committee on the fitting way in which they had commemorated the sons and daughter of their village who had paid the supreme price for the honor and safety of their country. He mentioned having been present at one of the patriotic meetings held in Wheatley River hall early in the War, and having been struck with the loyal and patriotic spirit of the gathering, at which several recruits had been gained. That had been years ago and since then he had no doubt but that there was not a family on Prince Edward Island that had not been bereaved and caused bitter grief as a result of the War. It was in the hearts of the people then, that the greatest memorial to the fallen boys and girls had been raised, and the one that would endure the longest.

Hon. Mr. Sinclair, who spoke for a few minutes, said that following such eloquent speakers, he could only echo the sentiments and thoughts they had expressed so well. He mentioned the effect that the raising of monuments had had in other times in other lands. The building of memorials in honor of Lord Nelson and his valiant deeds and victories, had exerted a profound influence over the youth of Great Britain in the time of their country's need.

Hon. Mr. McKinnon, after congratulating the district on the fine testimonial it was making to the heroism of its warriors, spoke for a short time on the history of Wheatley River and the surrounding country, from the time it had been carved from the forest by settlers, from France, and whose marks, in the way of place names, it bore to this day.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. R. H. Stavert.

Following the ceremony the visitors to the community were served a splendid supper in an adjoining field.

A large number of wreaths were placed at the foot of the monument by friends and relatives of those whose names it bore.

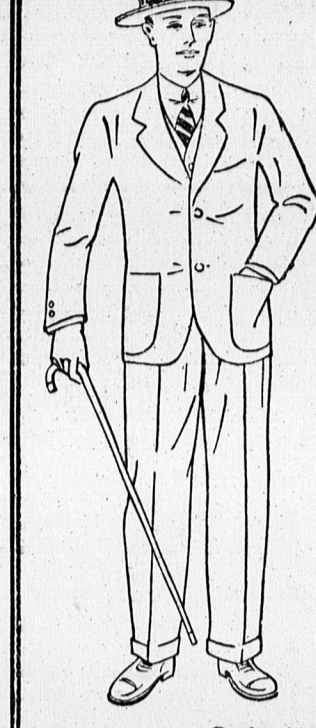

THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—Very light receipts and easy consumption demand continue to be the chief features of the egg trade in most sections of Canada. The Maritime's egg trade no change in conditions, and Vancouver and British Columbia steady market with fair receipts. Heavier receipts have had adverse effect on the Montreal market. Prairie points continue to report extremely light receipts, Toronto steady and unchanged, dealers pay 26c. Firsts 32 to 33; seconds 27 to 28. Montreal egg market easier and lower owing to heavier receipts. Continued hot weather is still affecting the consumption, fresh extras jobbing 41, firsts 38, seconds 34. Winnipeg receipts continue light, jobbing extras 36, firsts 33, seconds 31. Calgary egg receipts very light, jobbing extras \$11.50 per case, firsts \$10.50 per case, seconds \$9.50 per case. Vancouver local fresh egg market continues steady with dealers paying country points extras 28, firsts 26. The live poultry market continues steady and unchanged.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 12.—There is practically no change in the egg or poultry market; the egg receipts continue light with quality fair. Poultry shipments are a little more plentiful with the same price ruling.

ST. JOHN, local wholesale egg prices, extras 42, firsts 40, seconds 35. There are fresh stocks on hand and demand is good. The fresh kill-off chicken market is slow wholesale 40 fowl 28 retail chickens 45, fowl 33.

MONTREAL, Aug. 12.—Considerable business was transacted with foreign buyers in Canadian grain in the Montreal market today. Spot prices for oats were steady and the demand was moderate, owing to the excessive buying of American buyers, the winter wheat flour market was firmer, but there was no actual change in prices. There was no change in the spring wheat flour situation, both foreign and home being brisk. There was a good local and foreign demand for mill-feed today and trading in this commodity was easier than it has been for some time. In the rolled oat market there was a good business done and prices were steady. The foreign trade in butter was rather brisk and prices were steady. Extreme dullness marked the trading in the cheese market. The egg market was very quiet.

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 12.—Dominion Live Stock Branch, with but 55 cattle, 5 lambs, 266 hogs and 60 calves for sale on the two markets this morning trading was fairly good and all small stock was sold early. Cattle consisted of two loads common northwest steers and oxen and few local dairy cows and bulls. Calves offered were in keen demand and butchers paid \$8.50 for medium to just fair quality lots. Five good lambs brought \$13.00 and hogs \$13.75 to \$14.00 for straight lots. Sows were quoted up to \$11.50.
