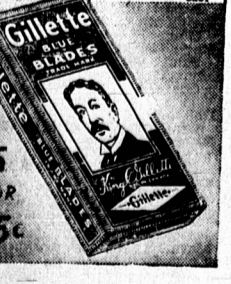

HANSON HOPES

"I believe the holding of a general election at this time or in the immediate future would be a distinct detriment to the successful conduct of the war. The most serious battles were yet to be fought. The Canadian air lines was a monopoly. Mr. Hanson said, expressing regret no mention of aviation policy was made in the throne speech.
"The policy is against internal extension and to prevent any competition or development by private enterprise," he said, "there should be a complete overhauling of both this policy and the actual practices."
"We are supposed to have a free economy in this country. Under a Liberal Government it is axiomatic but initiative in regard to air transport was put in a strait jacket. Recently an application to establish a route between Saint John, N. B., and Halifax had been refused "without just and reasonable cause."
The field was not occupied. Frequent flights did not fill the need. The Maritimes were denied a local service on the ground of military necessity.
"There is no such necessity," he said. Munitions Minister Howe said "it was turned down because it would be valuable for the people who are fighting our battles overseas." Mr. Hanson said he regretted Mr. King "has seen fit to reject practically out of hand the proposal of Lord Halifax as enunciated at the Empire relations conference. The logical conclusion of "an aviation, co-operation and coordination" in Empire relations was "unity in action." He hoped the path would be pursued to that conclusion.
