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IN MEMORIAM

CARL MACLURE

One of the most sad events to occur at Peters' Road, Lot 63, last year was the passing away of Carl MacLure, after a few days illness, at the age of nineteen years.

He was the only son of the late Gavin MacLure, tailor, of Murray Harbor North, (who passed away suddenly a little over two years ago), and Daisy Johnston, who predeceased her husband by three years, both of whom were known and respected by a very large circle of friends in this part of the Island.

Since the death of his father, Carl had made his home with his grandfather, Mr. Samuel Johnston at Peters' Road, where his quiet and gentlemanly manner made him a favorite with young and old alike. For several months last winter he held a position with the Montague Furniture Company, and the many kind and deeply sympathetic enquiries from that town during his illness gave marked evidence of the respect with which he was regarded there while at his daily duties on his grandfather's large farm he was painstaking, diligent and thorough and in that home his passing so suddenly has left a feeling of the deepest sorrow—the sorrow of those who lose a well beloved child.

The story of his passing away following a brief illness is but a repeating of many such deaths last year. He was one of almost one hundred cases of influenza in the neighborhood; but his soon developed into pneumonia, and from the first of that development little hope was held that he would recover.

Dr. MacIntyre came from Montague every day to see him, and made a most determined and praiseworthy fight for his patient, while a trained nurse was secured and remained to the end, which came on Sunday morning, December 29th.

The funeral was held on Monday, when Carl was laid to rest beside his father and mother. Owing to the prevailing epidemic his service was conducted in the open air in a brief manner by the Rev. Archibald Sutherland.

The only sister of the departed, Mrs. John Bowles, who resides with her grandfather until her husband returns from the war, was constantly by her brother's side during his illness, and much sympathy is being expressed for her in her loneliness.

He came to Westboro about 36 years ago and soon after went into the painting business which he conducted on a small scale till his death. He was a good, faithful man and gained the good will of his town's men and will be much missed.

He was for many years a member of the First Baptist Church, of Westboro.

Burial services were conducted from the Baptist Church on Wednesday Jan. 1st 1919 by Rev. Mr. Holland.

A delegation from the I. O. O. F. of which he was a member performed the last rites of that order at the church after which all that was mortal of another of our loved Island boys was laid to rest.

MISS ETTA FRASER

Many in town and country will hear with deep regret of the death of Etta Fraser who passed away last Friday morning at the home of her aunt Mrs. Barbara McKenzie Garfield, Belfast.
