EXCITEMENT IS UNABATED

Blair's Sole Object to Kill the Grand Trunk Pacific—He Wants no Favors from any Party or Corporation—Will Lead the Movement Against the Big Railway Scheme.

THE EXCITEMENT CONTINUES.

Sr. JOHN, Oct. 21.—A special despatch from Montreal to The Telegraph says: "The political excitement due to Hon. Mr. Blair's resignation from the Railway Commission, and his determination to take the public platform in strong opposition to the Grand Trunk Pacific deal, is greater than ever here, and from all quarters despatches come pouring in showing how the news has shaken the political world from seaboard to seaboard."

MANY RUMORS AFLOAT.

Wild rumors about Mr. Blair's intentions continue, and represent an attempt to offset the tremendous effect of his course.

These rumors can be met by a very simple announcement. It is this: TO BEAT THE G. T. P.

Mr. Blair wants nothing from any party or any corporation. He is out to beat the Grand Trunk Pacific deal. That is his sole object.

He was its original and most formidable opponent, and he steps from the office to head the great movement against the G. T. P., which is now engaging attention throughout Canada.

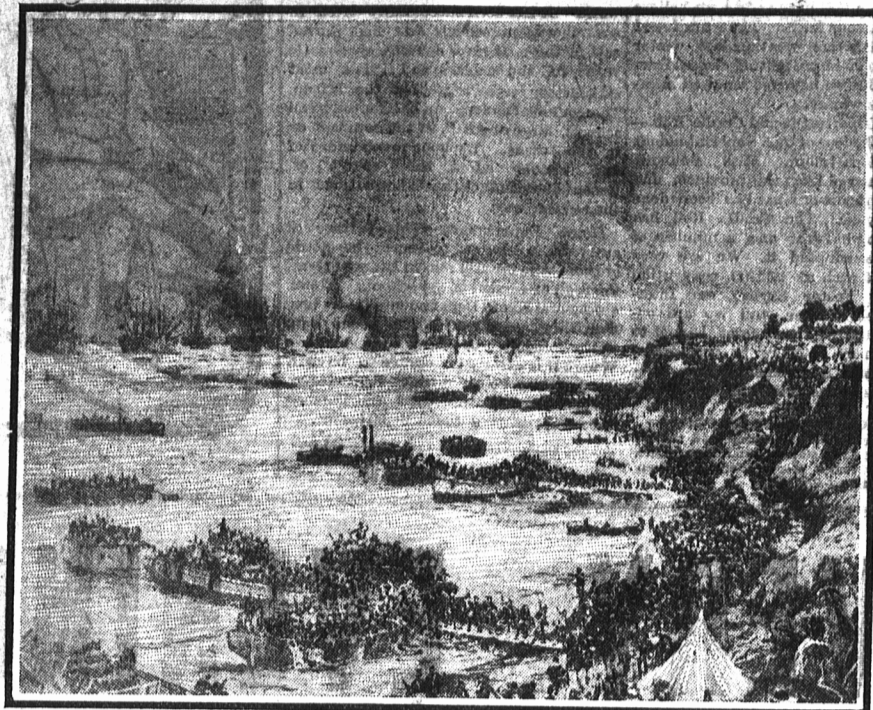

THE CORONER'S JURY STILL IN SESSION

The coroner's jury holding the inquest on the murder of Harriet Warren met again last night in the Court Room from eight till eleven.

Before commencing the proceeding the Coroner referred to the fact that complaint had been made that the inquest was not strictly private—that some had been admitted on previous evenings who had no right to be present. He asked the jury to withdraw and decide whether the inquest should be private or public.

They returned in a few minutes and reported that the inquest must be strictly private. Several legal gentlemen, The Guardian representative and others were thus forced to withdraw.

Shortly after the chairman of the Police Committee and another councillor appeared and were a little indignant at the unusual secrecy. They sent word to the coroner asking for admittance but the

reply was "strictly private."

The deliberations proceeded for some time and evidence was given by a number of witnesses but nothing material came out.

Later in the evening several more councillors came to the building in order to show their interest in the proceedings but after they had consulted with the foreman and others the reply was before "strictly private."

The secrecy was maintained and the proceedings were conducted only in the presence of several officers of the Court and the two detectives who are now in the city working on the case.

Nothing new came out but undoubtedly the extraordinary caution being taken to prevent the proceedings being known are for a purpose and the public must not be surprised should some startling developments be the outcome of the deliberations.

LOU DILLON LOSES TO MAJOR DELMAR

Mare Was in Bad Condition and Went on Track Against Advice of Veterinaries.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., October 18.—C. K. G. Billing's Lou Dillon, the champion trotting mare, went down to defeat to-day before Major Delmar, owned by E. E. Smith, in the third and last contest for the Memphis gold cup, the feature race of the opening day of the fourth annual meeting of the Memphis Trotting association. After sustaining a terrific pace to the three-quarters pole in the first heat on the

contest, it was apparent that the mare was in bad condition and she was pulled up. Major Delmar winning in a jog. Despite a critical examination by veterinary surgeons who pronounced the mare affected by an ailment known to horse men as the "thumps," Lou Dillon was again brought out on the track by Mr. Billings against the advice of the veterinaries, he announcing that, as a matter of form, he would start the mare in the second heat. Major Delmar rounded the course in easy time, Lou Dillon following at a slow trot. Mr. Smith's reporting the New York Driving club, becomes the permanent owner of the cup.

LORD DUNDONALD DENIES CHARGE

That he Favored Conscription or a Permanent Corps of 5,000—Election Frauds at the Soo Confessed and Liberal Cabinet Minister Said to be Implicated.

DUNDONALD'S DENIAL.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—Lord Dundonald, in an interview, states that the Toronto Globe's charge that he advocated conscription is utterly untrue.

He merely revised the old militia act by the request of the minister, keeping the same principles and introducing a new obligation for adult citizens.

AN ABSURD FALSEHOOD.

He did not recommend a permanent corps of 5,000. He only gave power to enlist if it is required in future.

The charge that he withheld the abolition

of the schools of instruction is absurd as these form an essential part of his scheme. A letter fully explaining these facts is now on its way to Canada.

CORRUPTION CONFESSED.

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 21.—A special from Saut Ste. Marie, Mich., says that P. J. Galvin, an employment agent in the Michigan Soo, who was charged with complicity in election frauds at the recent election of C. N. Smith, Liberal candidate for the Ontario legislature, has made a confession implicating among others a member of the Liberal cabinet.
