CURTIS IS SCORED BY PROSECUTION

State's Attorney Brands Norfolk Boatbuilder "Biggest Liar in The Country" At Close Of Hoax Case.

FLEMINGTON, N. J., July 1.—With a swift right-about in strategy, the defence in the John Hughes Curtis trial rested its case abruptly this afternoon less than an hour after beginning it. Curtis himself, whose veracity has been consistently attacked throughout his trial on a charge of obstructing justice in the Lindbergh case, was not put on the stand. Neither was Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, Betty Gow, the baby's nurse, nor the various police officers subpoenaed by the defence and expected to be subjected to cross-examination.

Lightning Kills On Lake Ontario

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 1.—Two persons were killed by a bolt of lightning and more than a score were injured in a terrific storm that struck this section today without warning. The dead are Robert Henderson, 21, and Norins Lang, 20, both of Batavia, N. Y. They were fishing in a boat in Irondequoit Bay, Lake Ontario, when the skies suddenly darkened, sheets of rain swept over the bay on a 30 mile gale, and lightning bolts struck repeatedly. Most of those injured were in dwellings where the bolts found marks. The toll of injured mounted steadily as reports trickled in from territory outside the city. Roofs were torn from at least a dozen Rochester buildings, plate glass windows of automobile sales rooms were blown in on new cars on display, a dairy just outside the city was levelled and a smaller building beside it carried away. Police received 200 emergency calls within less than an hour and every officer on the city's payroll was ordered to immediate duty.

HINDUS AND MOSLEMS RIOT IN BOMBAY

Ten Dead And 200 Casualties In Yesterday's Disorders.

BOMBAY, India, July 1.—The enmity between Moslems and Hindus, which has long harassed police authorities throughout India, broke out into riots yesterday and today which resulted in 10 deaths and a casualty list of more than 200. So fierce were the religious combatants that all shops and markets of Bombay were forced to close, and armed police took control of the streets of the city. The cause of the initial outbreak was not immediately determined, but fuel was added to the flame when 1,000 Moslem mourners started a funeral procession through a Hindu section of the city. Many clashes flared and six times police had to fire on mobs before they could disperse them and stop the incidental rioting.

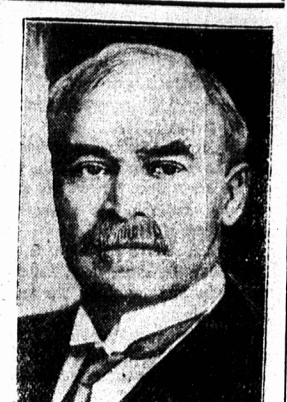

Legislation To Legalize Beer Before House

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Legislation to legalize beer was brought before the United States Senate today, with its sponsors claiming enough votes to pass it in view of the Democratic Party's stand for immediate modification of the Volstead Act. The beer proposal was presented by Senator Bingham, Republican, Connecticut, as conferees on the gigantic unemployment relief bill permit reporting the measure to the House of Representatives and Senate next Tuesday. It carries \$2,100,000,000, and by removal of this obstacle leaders are hoping for an adjournment next week. CATTLE TRADE WITH ENGLAND ON INCREASE

OTTAWA, June 30.—Canada shipped 9,793 live cattle to Britain this season up to the end of June. This compares with 8,145 head for the corresponding period last year. Any steps taken by the British government to impose special duties on the Irish Free State to counter the failure of the Free State to pay the half-yearly land annuities of \$1,500,000, may have an important bearing on the cattle trade. Ireland is the only competitor of Canada in the live cattle shipments to the British markets other than the competition from the domestic grown stock. Ireland has had a slight advantage in that the movement of cattle to Britain is seasonal. (Continued on Page 10)

United States Congratulates The Dominion

Secy. Of State Stimson Sends Greetings To Canada On Her National Birthday—A Message Of Understanding And Affection

WASHINGTON, July 1.—A greeting to a "good neighbor" was extended to Canada today on Dominion Day by Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of State of the United States. In a broadcast address, Mr. Stimson said differences between Canada and the United States are trivial because of a "friendship and understanding" that "flow from the deep waters of similar origin and similar traditions." "The United States congratulates Canada," Stimson said. "May she flourish and wax greater as the years pass. In your growth there is nothing but gain for you, for us and for the world. The United States has a good neighbor and we rejoice with her." His speech in full follows: "To my Canadian friends: 'I extend the greetings of the people of the United States to the people of Canada on the national birthday of the Dominion. My message is more than one of formal greeting. It is not merely a courteous word of remembrance such as might be exchanged between distant neighbors. It is a message of understanding and affection.'"
