He is survived by a wife, three sisters and three brothers, two of whom, Allan and Clark Sharpe, live in Vancouver, while the third, Arthur Sharpe, is a resident of Seattle.

The death occurred on the 20th ult. at Albany, of Gilbert Bell. Deceased was born in Nine Mile Creek, August 4th, 1837, where he lived till 1867, when he removed to Albany. He was one of the best known and most prosperous farmers of that section. He leaves to mourn besides his widow, six sons and four daughters. The funeral took place on July 22nd, at Cape Traverse cemetery Rev. James McDougall conducted the funeral services. The funeral was largely attended.

The death occurred at his home in Timish yesterday morning of Patrick Hogan, Esq., one of the best known farmers of West Prince. Deceased was 74 years of age and has been in failing health for some time. He leaves to mourn a large family consisting of six daughters and five sons. Among the latter are Rev. Father Hogan former parish priest at Tracadie P. E. I., Dr. S. P. Hogan of Teasdale, Sask., and Frank Hogan, a popular lumber merchant of the same place. Mr. Hogan was a prosperous farmer owning one of the finest farms situated at the extreme west end of the Island.

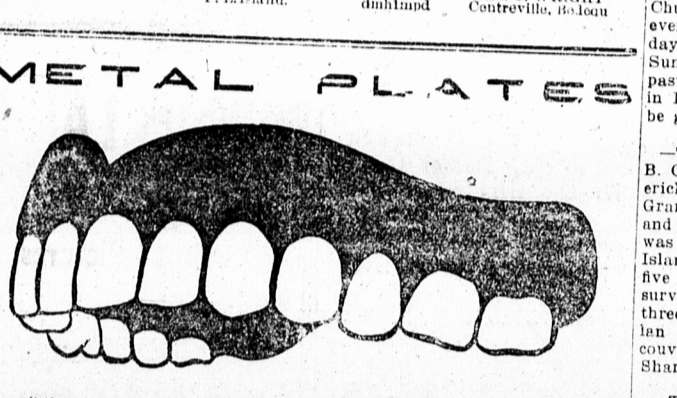
