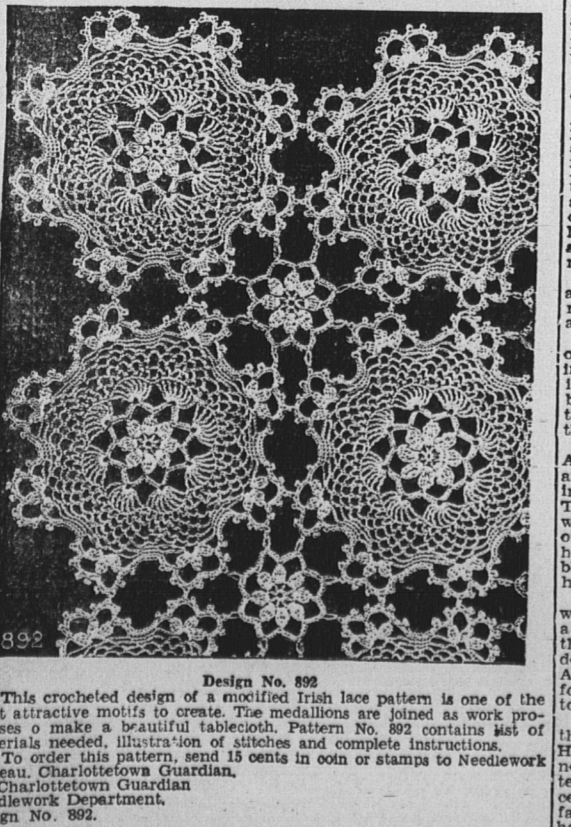

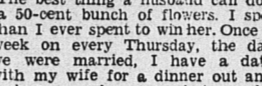

THE COOK'S CORNER

FRANKFURTER PLATTER

6 frankfurters Grated cheese 2 cups boiled rice 2 cups canned or cooked peas 4 tablesp-ons butter METHOD: Place the rice on the bottom of a greased baking platter then arrange the peas over it. Split the frankfurters and fill the slit with grated cheese, place these on top of the peas. Dot the top with butter and peas in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about 30 minutes.

FRANKFURTER CASSEROLE

3 cups hot mashed potatoes 6 frankfurters 1 No. 2 can corn 1-2 tablesp-ons melted butter Salt and pepper METHOD: Place hot mashed potatoes in the bottom of a greased baking dish and arrange the frankfurters in the potatoes. Add the contents of a can of cream style corn, dot with butter and season with salt and pepper to taste. Cover the dish and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about 35 minutes.

CRUSTY FRANKFURTERS

2 1-2 cups mashed potatoes 1 egg 1-2 teaspoon salt Dash of pepper 1 tablesp-oon minced parsley 1 pound frankfurters 1 cup crushed cornflakes METHOD: Add the well beaten egg to the hot mashed potatoes and season with salt and pepper, then add the minced parsley. Cover each frankfurter with the potato mixture making the coating about 1-4 inch thick. Now roll the coated frankfurters in crushed cornflakes and bake in a hot oven (425 deg. F.) for about 20 minutes, or fry in deep fat heated to 390 deg. F. or until the fat will brown a day old cube of bread in 40 seconds. Fry or bake until they are golden brown. Serve with green beans or spinach, and sliced tomatoes. Frankfurters are also good in combination with sauerkraut, and here's a method of preparing such a dish.
