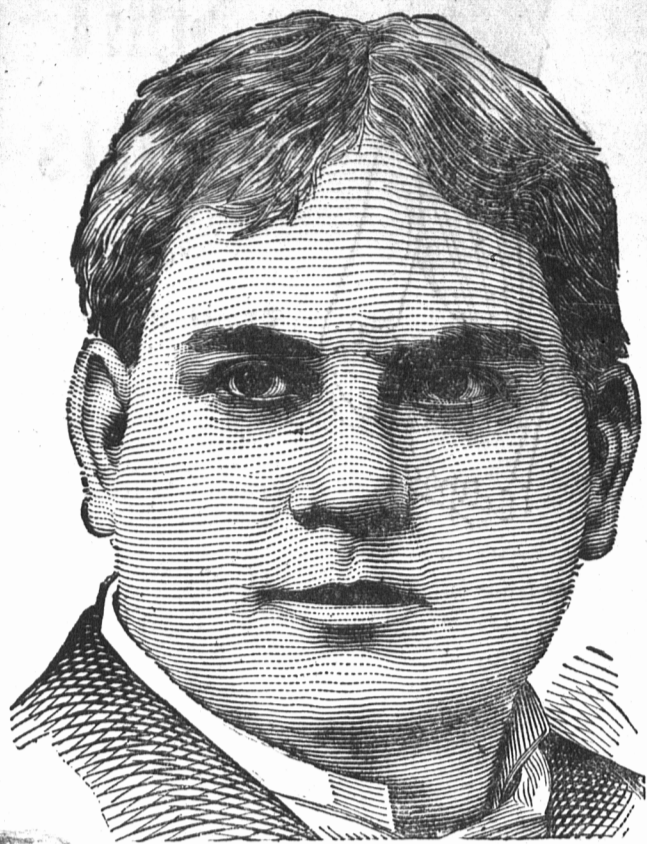

SUMMERSIDE POTATO MARKET

POTATOES dropped to 40cts in Summerside yesterday. The high price of 47cts paid on the previous day induced many farmers to bring their potatoes in and the rush was entirely too heavy, so that the price suddenly declined. Foreign markets will not warrant heavy purchases at such a figure. At this season of the year potatoes sprout so that when the market is overloaded they will not bring such prices as when they are supplied slowly. The local market has been lively during the last few days. Daily the Northumberland carries large cargoes, and several schooner loads are being transported to the mainland. Yesterday evening a load of 42 cars of potatoes from points east and west arrived in Summerside for shipment. There is liable to be fluctuations in prices during the next few days as there is a keen competition amongst buyers.

THERE were five horses among the shipments by the Northumberland yesterday morning. The steamer had a full cargo composed chiefly of oats and potatoes.

B. D. Sharp has sold his Yacht Kohonoo, one of the best known pleasure boats of our harbor craft to Mr. Black of Charlottetown. The boat was delivered last evening.

MR. MAXWELL, C. E., arrived in Summerside yesterday from Sydney. On Tuesday night he will address the citizens in Market Hall on the question of Waterworks and Sewerage.

O'LEARY was the scene of a busy potato market Thursday, the new firm of Ellis & Kennedy being the principal buyers. They loaded in the vicinity of 2,000 bushels paying the farmers the nice sum of \$1,000 or thereabouts.

The first schooners to arrive here this season were the Merry May, Captain McKay, and the Ida M., Capt. Mellett, which came in yesterday evening coal laden from Pictou. The cargoes are especially welcome considering that the town is very short of coal at present.

At last Summerside is to have a military band. Yesterday Col. Stewart and Capt. Goodwill of Charlottetown while in Summerside concluded arrangements for the organization of a band in connection with No. 2 Co., 82nd Regt. It is intended to utilize the instruments of the Boys' Own Band while new instruments and uniforms will be ordered at once. Prof. Whitney will be bandmaster and the membership will be 24 men. The Boys' Own gave an exhibition of their playing in the presence of Messrs. Stewart and Goodwill yesterday evening which highly pleased the visitors.
