EXPOSED PLOT MAY BE PART OF BIG LIQUOR SCANDAL IS HUSHED

ROME, June 23.—It is learned that an agent of the Fascist party, named Dumini, has broken down and made a complete confession of the kidnaping and killing of Deputy Matteotti.

At first Dumini willed when undeniable evidence was placed against him and he exposed the entire plot. The confession positively implicated Cesare Rossi, former director of publicity for the Department of the Interior, Filippo Filippelli, editor of the Corriere de Italiano, and Marinelli, administrative secretary of the Fascist party.

Five Committed Murder. All these are Fascists and according to Dumini, ordered the killing and paid the assassins. He admitted that he himself and four others did the actual slaying. The body had not been found.

He said Matteotti was dragged into a motor car they had hired and was killed a few minutes after getting into the car.

The slayers then drove to the woods surrounding Lake Vico, where the body was tossed out of the car and abandoned. The slayers hurried back to Rome, where Dumini says he rushed into the office of the Corriere Italiano and told Filippelli that the murder had been carried out.

Apparently enjoying his usual health, the late Mr. Hennessey, accompanied by his family, spent Sunday afternoon driving in the country. It was shortly after this outing that he was stricken with the illness which resulted in his death.

WIRE BRIEFS Last Minute News Flashed in Over the Wires

(Canadian Press.) CAPE TOWN, June 23.—Jan Christian Smuts, Premier of the Union of South Africa, was defeated in the recent elections, resigned the premiership today.

ROME, June 23.—Giornale D'Italia in today's issue said Premier Mussolini and commander Giardio Debono are planning to reorganize the Fascist military body making it a still more constitutional organization with police powers. Supervision would be transferred from the Ministry of Interior to the Ministry of War and an army general in active military service placed in command.

BROCKVILLE, Ont., Jan 23. Colonel J. Wesley Allison, internationally known promoter and business man died last night at his summer residence Allison Island in the St. Lawrence opposite Morrisburg. He was most prominent before the Canadian public during war days when Sir Sam Hughes was Minister of Militia.

Treasure Recovered From Sunken Laurentic

LONDON, June 23.—Practically the whole of the gold and silver which went down on the Laurentic in Lough Swilly during the war amounting to six and a quarter million pounds sterling has been recovered from its bed off the Northern Ireland coast. The salvage section of the Royal Navy ceased work on this job.

NEW YORK, June 23.—Miss Elizabeth Wurtzman, who received a fortune of \$150,000 from the estate of an aged recluse who died last November in a public ward on Welfare Island, has resigned as teacher in Public School 3, West New York.

FEAR TROUBLE IN MEXICAN ELECTIONS

MEXICO CITY, June 23.—With the Mexican Presidential elections only a fortnight away, rumors of political and industrial unrest have become current.

A general strike is threatened among the workers in the oil fields near Tampico and Vera Cruz, where employees of the Mexican Eagle Company, a British organization have refused to accept the proposals of the Mexican Federation of Labor for a settlement of their wage demands.

The Federation of Labor is supporting E. P. Latoro Calles for the Presidency, a fact which has injected politics into the industrial situation.

LOS ANGELES, June 23.—Martin Colson has no regrets over his love for Mrs. Clarence B. Walden, which, he told police, caused him to set fire to her husband's home. His theory was that if they were reduced to poverty, Mrs. Walden, who had indignantly spurned his attentions, might change her attitude towards him.

Toronto and Windsor Are Only Cities Directly Affected

TORONTO, June 23.—The Postal Workers Strike Committee at the Labor Temple this morning announced that the following telegram had been sent to the Montreal Strike Committee: "Please accept offer of railway engineers to man no more trains carrying mail. Send our representatives to see their representatives to express approval."

Dead in Digby Bullet in Brain

DIGBY, June 23.—With his left temple pierced with a bullet fired from a revolver, presumably in his own hand, while in a state of temporary insanity, the lifeless body of Leamon Doane, aged 40, was found at his home in Digby, near here, early this morning by neighbors. He was married and is survived by his mother, one brother and several sisters residing in Massachusetts.

Smoking Car For Women Travelers

CHICAGO, June 23.—Equal rights for women took another step forward here last week when the Illinois Central Railway, attached to its St. Louis-Chicago daylight special a lounge and smoking car for women. They may smoke there to their hearts' content without fear of intrusion from men, railway officials stated. The car will be a regular part of the train in the future.

Threatened To Bombard City

PEKING, June 23.—Under threat that he would bombard the city of Wanshan, on the Yangtze River in Szechwan Province, the Commander of the British Gunboat Cockchafer, compelled the highest military leaders there to walk to the cemetery in full uniform behind the body of Edwin C. Hawley, a United States citizen killed there by Chinese Junkmen and to attend the burial service for him.

SIX MONTREAL BANDITS HAVE BEEN CONDEMNED TO DEATH

MONTREAL, Que., June 23.—Leo Davis, Tony Frank, Loula Morel, Mike Valentino, Frank Gambino and Giuseppe Serafini were found guilty of the murder of Henri Cleroux, Bank of Hochelaga chauffeur who was shot to death during the holdup of the collection car April 1, 1924, by a jury in the Court of King's Bench this afternoon.

The six men were sentenced to hang October 24th by Mr. Justice Wilson after the jury returned the verdict. The jury took exactly eleven minutes to agree on the verdict which they delivered at 5.30 this afternoon. Jurymen number six spoke for the twelve.

"Guilty of murder" was the reply as the names of each of the prisoners were called out. The court after a fifteen minutes conference between the judge and lawyers addressed formally an inquiry to Serafini if he had anything to say as to why formal sentence should not be passed upon him.

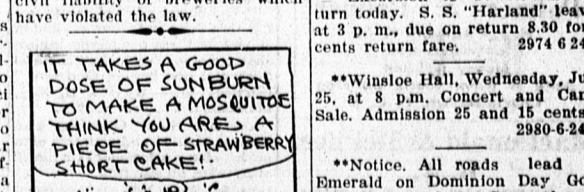
Leaving For Petawawa

FRANCE NOW TURNS TO THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS FOR AID Contrary To the Millerand-Poincare Bloc The New Regime Will Seek the Advice of the League (United Press.) NEW YORK, June 23.—France's new ally under the left radical bloc government will be the League of Nations. Instead of continuing to base France's defenses upon the French army and a circle of small and weak nations about Germany, France intends to experiment with the Geneva organization. The late Millerand-Poincare policy was based on French military superiority and distrust of the League. The left bloc will be able to save money on army expenses and reduce the eighteen months' conscription term by accepting the inevitable fact that France and her little ententes cannot master continental Europe. This change in policy will lead to the most far reaching consequences in the settlement of Europe's problems. Henceforth, (Continued on Page 3)
