Car Ferry hearing Is adjourned

HALFAX, Dec. 11 —(CP)—The court of wreck commissions, called by the Federal Department of Transport to inquire into the sinking of the ferry S. S. Charlotte town last June 18, adjourned today until Dec. 29 because of the inability of several witnesses to attend the sessions.
Adjournment was suggested by J. G. Fogo and T. L. Linklater, appearing for the department of transport and was agreed to by I. C. Rand, representing the Canadian National Railways and W. C. MacDonald appearing for Capt. John Read master of the ferry.
Hearing the inquiry was Judge M. B. Archibald, assisted by Cmr. W. B. Armit, R.C.N., and Capt. Goudey.

Americans in Canadian Forces Remain at posts

OTTAWA, Dec. 11 —(CP)—Young Americans in the fighting forces of Canada are expected to remain where they are instead of returning in number to their homeland now that war with Japan has broken out, officials said today.
Nearly 10,000 Americans are serving with the Canadian active army and 10 per cent of air crews trained or in training for the R.C.A.F. are Americans.
About 800 Americans are instructors for the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan.
Discussing the position of the American volunteers, officials said the Japanese assault on United States possessions had emphasized the necessity for co-operation between Canada and the United States in defence of North America.
Officials said it was to be expected an American could serve the common cause just as effectively in the Canadian army as if he went home and joined a unit there.

VICKS VA-TRO-NOL Former Islander Prominent figure In Daly City, Cal.

A San Francisco paper of recent date refers to U. S. citizenship papers having been granted to John William Marchbank, a native of Desable, this Province, and now a well known horse breeder and owner of Tanforan race track, Daly City, Cal. The item states that Mr. Marchbank is 71 years of age, and came to the United States from Alaska.
The above clipping was received by Mr. John Anderson, City, in a letter from Mr. Malcolm Macqueen of Winnipeg. Mr. Macqueen had it from a California correspondent who stated that Mr. Marchbank is a man of great wealth and benevolence, and is regarded by the people of Daly City as "the greatest man that ever put a foot in their town." Before the Alaska gold rush he had worked in the mines in British Columbia, where he lost his leg. With that handicap he made his way to Dawson and Nome, picking up a fortune. After several years in Alaska he came to San Francisco, where he shortly established himself in Daly City, where he acquired the Tanforan race track, which, writes Mr. Macqueen's correspondent, "must have cost a cool million." Mr. Marchbank is believed to be the only man in the United States who owns a race track. Last fall Tanforan made the unprecedented offer of six full days of charity racing.

To remove R.C.A.F. Recruiting unit From Province

OTTAWA, Dec. 11 —(CP)—Prince Edward Island's response to Canada's call for men has been so enthusiastic and complete that the need for a permanent Royal Canadian Air Force (R.C.A.F.) headquarters announced today. It will be closed Dec. 31.
However, modern mobile recruiting units operating from the mainland, will tour the Island at regular intervals to afford the same opportunities for enlistment as were provided by the Charlottetown centre.
Of Prince Edward Island's total population of 83,000 people, nearly 7,000 men have enlisted in the active forces. Of these more than 400 have joined the Royal Canadian Air Force during the last year. In recent months a distinct falling-off in enlistments has been accounted for by the fact that few, if any, men eligible for air crews remain in civilian life.
During the winter months when roads are impassable the mobile unit will travel through the Island by train. As soon as roads are open the unit will operate by motor.

Chinese, the Netherlands and the republics of the new world are standing up to be counted, and Russia is now driving the Germans back through the chill wastes of the Soviet Union and sealing "one of the outstanding blunders of history."
Summing up the greatest division of nations since the world began, he declared:—
"Not only the British Empire now, but the United States are fighting for life. Russia is fighting for life. China is fighting for life. Behind these four great combatants and communities are ranged all the spirit and hope of all the conquered countries in Europe, prostrate under the cruel domination of the foe.
"I said the other day that four-fifths of the human race were on our side.
"It may well be an understatement. Just handfuls and cliques of wicked men and their military or party organizations have been able to bring these hideous evils upon mankind.
"It would indeed bring shame upon our generation if we did not teach them a lesson which will not be forgotten in the records of 1,000 years."
The political and military advantages of the complete British-American alliance now joined was seen here tonight after Mr. Churchill's speech and the final action of the American Congress, as immeasurable both in morale and in weapons.
Many quarters predicted that the morale of the German and Italian peoples would suffer tremendously with the realization that the full might of America is now arrayed against them.
Reviewing before Parliament the course of a struggle that now convulses almost the whole of the habitable globe, Prime Minister Churchill found as always news that was good and news that was bad.
Aside from Russia—where he said Hitler's disaster would constitute an event of cardinal importance in the final decision of the war—and where the German armies already had suffered "a bloody loss almost unequalled in history"—he reported victory for the first phase of the British offensive in North Africa.
"True he said, not all had gone as had been wished, but nevertheless I am proud to say it seems very probable that it would do so.
British mastery was attained in the first phase despite tank losses heavier than had been expected, he went on, and British air strength remains superior for the last phase despite the "most extravagant" aerial reinforcements brought in by the Germans from the Russian and other fronts.
Cunningham Replaced
He disclosed incidentally that the Libyan field commander, Gen. Cunningham, had been replaced.

Unnecessary Driving Is Disloyalty

"To the motorist, I think it should be pointed out that Canada is faced with a most serious shortage of rubber," said Mr. Williamson. "Unnecessary driving is not merely wasteful; it is downright disloyalty."
He said he foresaw no problem of violation on the part of dealers of the supply of rubber and cork is considered essential in the manufacture of airplanes and various other war materials. In many cases cork is the only practical substitute for rubber, and the sole source of cork is Portugal—in the European war zone—placing the supply in jeopardy.
The world supply of crude rubber comes almost entirely from Malaya, Ceylon and the Netherlands East Indies. Previous sources, Indo-China and the west coast of Africa, have been cut off by war conditions.
Sharp restriction of other domestic products requiring rubber is anticipated under a curfew law which will leave only about 300 tons of rubber a week available for civilian purposes. Exports are likely to be entirely cut off.
The program which was in effect prior to the Pacific outbreak released to civilian manufacturers up to 80 per cent of their average monthly consumption from June 1, 1940 to May 31, 1941. It was proposed to reduce this percentage to 75 per cent in January and 70 per cent in February but more drastic restrictions now are anticipated.
Canada's entire rubber stock is at present under control of a crown administrative company, Fairmont Co. Ltd., which was incorporated by the government earlier this year to purchase, store and sell rubber to war industries.
In the United States rubber was one of the first materials to fall under government control following a state of war. Announcement was made in Washington Tuesday that plans were being drafted to halt tire production for two weeks while restrictions were framed.
