Also please note change parcels please send same to the "Secretary Red Cross Society, Prisoner of War Department, 14 Cockspur St., London." All parcels must be sent to the Red Cross first and they will send same on to me, as private individuals are not allowed to send same to prisoners of war. I think the cost of living has increased double in pretty high every country. Eggs are fetching 2 fr. (50c) a dozen here. We are having some pretty decent weather here this month but when you come here in May last year it rained on and for about a month. I am glad to get out of Germany though I wouldn't care if it rained for a twelve-month. Anything is better than the hell we left. I hope now that the U. AMSTERDAM.—The Dutch Catholic newspaper Tjd prints the program that was issued as the result of a meeting of Catholics in favor of peace held last Whit Sunday at Graz, Austria. The program contains twelve paragraphs which demand that an end be put to the senseless exhaustion of military power on land and sea.

Credits for military objects, it says, should be granted only where they are needed for maintaining internal order. Racial conflicts of one nation with another must cease and the natural right of every people to develop should be undisturbed and the preservation of its own language and civilization guaranteed, the program declares.
