LIBERAL MOTION DEFEATED BY 34 MAJORITY

Sentenced To 14 Years

JOLLETTE, Que., Feb. 13.—Sentence of 14 years in the penitentiary was imposed today upon Gaston Bouchard, indicted for the murder of Acting Investigator James Macle of the Canadian Pacific Railway at the Lamorne freight yards on September 8, 1933, and convicted of manslaughter by jury, Mr. Justice Philmon, Court-martial imposed the penalty.

GOVERNMENT SCORES MAJOR VICTORY

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—The Bennett Government won its first major victory of the session today when the House voted down, 110 to 76, a Liberal want-of-confidence motion moved in amendment to the address. Enlisting the support of two Progressives, A. M. Carmichael, Kindersley, and Donald Kennedy, Peace River, the administration rolled up a majority of 34 against the Liberals and the bulk of the third group.

New Motion

As soon as the Conservatives voted down the anti-government motion, they ran into another. Before the main motion, the passing of the address, was reached, James S. Woodcock, Dominion leader of the C. O. F., moved to place the House on record as saying the Government had "not taken such steps as are necessary to deal adequately with unemployment, to reduce the burden imposed by the public debt and to put the agricultural industry on a basis that will ensure to the farmer a decent standard of living." This threw open the whole debate which may stretch along for several days.

Galleries Crowded

Crowded galleries witnessed the first major test of parliamentary strength this session after a long day of debate dominated by front benchers from both sides of the House. The address debate, which had been languishing for 10 days, snapped back to action with Hon. R. S. Macdonald, Minister of Railways and Trade and Commerce, repelling attacks against the ministry hurled by three former Liberal cabinet members, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Hon. Ian MacKenzie and Hon. James L. Ralston.

Temper Flare

Temper snapped several times during the day and points of order flew thick and fast, especially when Premier R. B. Bennett and Mr. Ralston clashed on the history of the Government.

There was little chance the drifting wreck was the little schooner Ospece, carrying three Ontario adventures on a trip down the Atlantic to Bermuda. Captain Angus Walters of the racing banker Elsie Ospece, who helped outfit the 42-foot schooner, said today he was "almost certain" it was not her. Overturned, he would be very low in the water, and a vessel would have to pass very close by to sight her.
