St. Francis X., 12; King's College, 1

WINDSOR, N. S., Feb. 12.—St. Francis Xavier won from Kings here tonight by a score of 12-1 in a game of the Eastern Intercollegiate league. The ice was good and the game fast throughout. St. Francis showed up as greatly superior in both speed and stick handling, but the Kings team played hard right up to the last. Kings started the scoring in the first period but was unable to keep it up and played a defensive game for the rest of the time. C. L. Boulden refereed very satisfactorily. The St. Francis team was entertained at a banquet given by the Kings College Amateur Athletic Association after the game.

Lewis Loses Out In Ring Wrangle

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—The New York state boxing commission today ruled as illegal the use of a rubber mouth-piece protector, such as worn by Ted "Kid" Lewis in his bout at Madison Square Garden last Monday with Jack Britton, world's welterweight champion.

The ruling was announced after a hearing before a sub-committee, at which Britton, charged with misconduct in the ring, admitted that he went to his opponent's corner just after the second round ended and struck Selig Goodman, one of Lewis' seconds, during an argument over the use of the protector. Decision in his case was reversed for consideration of the entire boxing commission and license committee.

Britton, who apologized to the committee for his action, said that as a championship title was at stake he felt justified in going to his opponent's corner to demand that Lewis refrain from using the protector.

Lewis testified today that the protector was necessary because he had tender lips, which were cut easily, while Britton contended that it really was a shock absorber. The champion added that he had met Lewis a score of times and always had argued against the use of the mouth-piece, especially in a contest at Boston four years ago when they had a "wrangle" over it.

The Markets

MONTREAL, Feb. 12.—There was practically no further change in local egg prices today, but the undertone to the market continues heavy on account of the liberal supplies coming forward, for which the demand is somewhat limited owing to the fact that the consumption is not increasing as fast as it should, which is due to the retail stores holding pieces at a higher level than the condition of the market warrants, and the sooner they get down to a proper basis and give the consumer the benefit of the lower prices they are purchasing at, the better it will be for all concerned in the trade. In a wholesale way a fair trade was done today in new laid eggs at 60c per dozen, and the indications are that they will go still lower in the near future. The receipts today were 561 cases, as against 783 for the same day last week, and 184 for the corresponding day a year ago. Chinese eggs are being offered freely, but are not meeting with a ready sale, as the quality is not giving satisfaction. Arrivals of Chinese eggs at Vancouver to date total 41,471 cases, but only 3,625 cases of these were billed to Canadian points.

Receipts of fresh-killed dressed poultry are extremely light, and the market is firm at unchanged prices. Considerable storage poultry is moving into consumption at about the same prices as fresh-killed. Some storage stock has changed hands between dealers, which would seem to indicate a difference of opinion as to the future course of the market. Shipments of live chickens to Buffalo last week from Western Ontario points brought 34c per lb, delivered.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows:

There was no further change in the condition of the market for potatoes today, but the undertone is easy on account of the liberal supplies offering for shipment from the country, for which there is only a limited demand at present, as dealers in most cases have ample stocks on hand for the time being, in consequence the trade is quiet, with car lots of Green Mountain and Quebec stock quoted at \$1.10 to \$1.10 per bag of 90 lbs. ex-track, and in a wholesale jobbing way sales were made at \$1.25 to \$1.40 per bag of 80 lbs. ex-store.
