WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 9 — Another week of extremely high temperatures and little rain other than scattered showers has furthered decreased crop prospects on the Prairies. All grain is maturing too rapidly and the later sown crops are suffering particularly. The full extent of the loss of field and grade will probably not be realized until more of the crop has been threshed, according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways. A rain would still be of benefit to the later sown crops, but the early sown grain has reached the point where little would be gained by general rains now.
