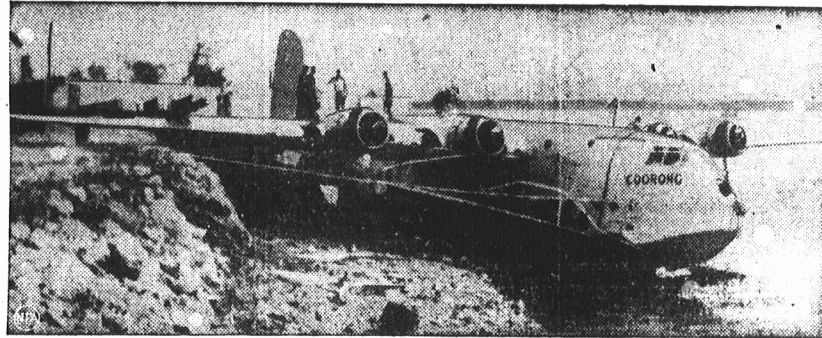
Belgium's handsome widower King Leopold and Princess Irene of Greece, pictured here, may marry, Paris newspapers report.

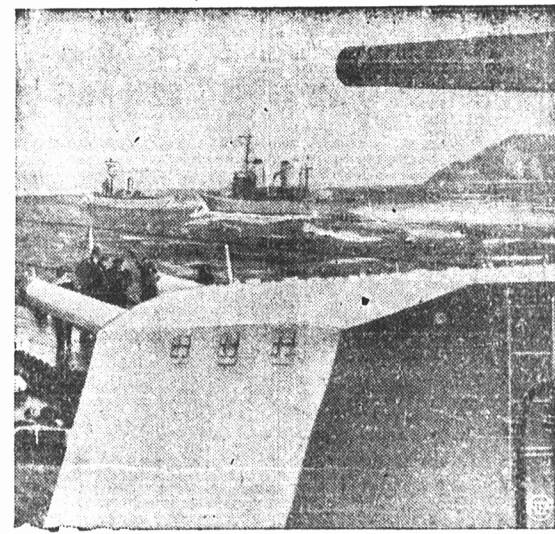

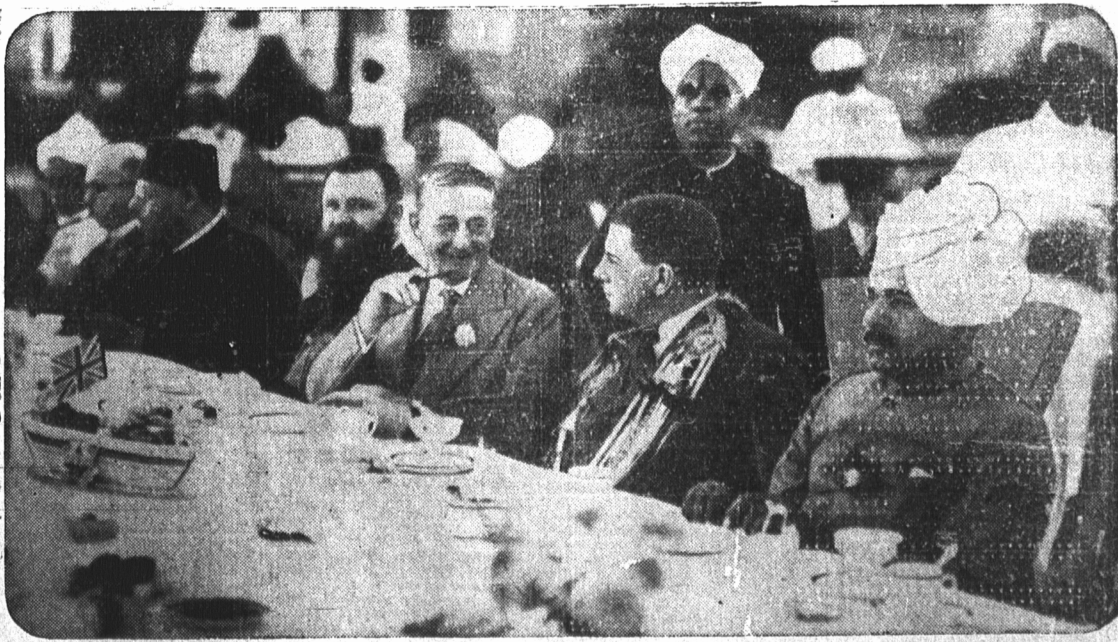
Continuing displays of naval forces such as this one—staged at Cersica for Premier Daladier—France ordered warships to maneuver from one end of the Mediterranean to the other.
