Daylight Saving Time Controversy Renewed

BY FRED KERNER, Canadian Press Staff Writer The old bugbear of city and town councils from coast to coast—Daylight Saving Time—has raised its ugly head now that Government wartime controls have been relaxed and the daylight saving decision has been thrown back into the lap of municipal councillors. The over-all result is that without Government decree setting clocks ahead during the summer months, Canadian cities present a hodge-podge picture from the end of April to the end of September. Even among cities which have decided to adopt daylight time, there is discrepancy in the dates during which it is observed. Generally in municipalities where clocks are to be put ahead for the five-month period, the dates have been set between April 28 and Sept. 29. This is not the case, however, in Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., where city council set May 15 to Sept. 1 as dates of observance. In Regina, the clocks will be moved an hour fast April 14, while Peterborough, Ont., time will be advanced a day early—April 21. In Quilich, Ont., daylight saving time will come to an end Sept. 14, and Sudbury, Ont., has set the dates between April 30 and Sept. 20. Instituted to save electric power during the war, the Dominion Government attitude is that daylight time is not a federal matter now and the issue reverts to the provincial and municipal arena. Among other Ontario cities to observe daylight saving time are

Conservative member of the Federal House for Brant, who at one time was five-president of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture and now is key adviser to his Party on agricultural policy, said the Government will not institute daylight time—and it is not an issue connected with politics, he said—because Canadian farmers would object. The net effect of daylight saving on farming, Mr. Charlton said, is that it tends to shorten the harvest by an hour every day. In Western Canada, Regina is the only city that has decided to switch to "summer time," though Winnipeg is still considering such a move. The Moose Jaw City Council has asked the Dominion Government to head the suggestion of West Falls Canadian Mayor's Federation executive meeting which approved daylight time on a uniform basis across the country. To overcome the confusion to some extent—and to it from the travellers point of view—railway and airline schedules continue to remain on standard time. In the Maritimes, the largest Nova Scotia cities and Saint John, N.B. and Charlottetown, P. E. I., will operate on daylight time as will Quebec City, Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto. Timmins, Chatham and London will not observe "summer time," while Stratford, Owen Sound, Sarnia and St. Thomas have yet to consider such a move.
