**WATCH WASHINGTON!**

Worries about the Philadelphia Athletics making the 1931 American League pennant race a runaway affair appears to have been premature.

While bookmakers, fans, sports writers and six other clubs have been conceding the flat to the Athletics, the Washington Senators have been playing the game for all it was worth and insisting that the race instead of being over really had hardly started.

Washington's stubbornness has been paying dividends in the last week and now the Senators are only three games behind their rivals. The Senators defeated St. Louis yesterday to gain a full game on the Athletics, who lost to Cleveland, for a total gain of two games during the last week. Fine relief pitching by Bump Hadley gave Washington its 9-3 triumph over St. Louis for the Senators ninth consecutive victory and their 12th win in 13 starts.

**FORMER CHAMPION WOULD RETURN TO THE RING**

Benny Leonard, who retired from the ring when he was lightweight champion of the world, seems serious in his intentions to travel the "comeback" trail, and compete in the welterweight division. This announcement, however has caused no wild acclaim as the vast majority of boxing critics believe that Leonard will attempt the impossible, and that he will be only the shell of the great miltman who was invincible in his day.

Leonard made a fortune before he hung up his gloves, but it is said that stock market slumps and other ill-advised ventures hit him heavy blows financially. If this is true, it may be the reason that at the age of 35 and after years of inactivity he would dare to return as a competitor.

In entering the welterweight class Leonard courts trouble, because some of the men in that division now compare favorably with those of the past. Boxers like Jimmy McLarnin, Jack Fields, Young Corbett and Jack Thompson, the last named champion, would probably have been able to give Leonard an argument when the latter was at his best.

In the last few years Leonard has been interested in professional hockey, but he didn't have any luck in that he had the misfortune to be connected with Pittsburgh and then with Philadelphia. An experience of this kind is enough to drive a man to destruction, something Leonard may do

by becoming a boxer again. His admirers, who are legion, would prefer to remember him as one of the best men the ring ever knew than to have him humiliated by a boxer of inferior ability.

**SCOTT DIVES AGAIN**

Phil Scott, whom many misguided Englishmen at one time thought might lift the world's heavyweight title, fell again into his habitual victim role before the ponderous fists of Larry Gaines, Canada's colored cauliflower product. Scott trained four months for the fight and lasted two rounds. It would have been a fearful waste of time on Mr. Scott's part, except for the fact that 30,000 of his compatriots parted with their pounds, shillings and pence to see him put into a state of suspended animation. Gaines hit him lightly in the first round and Philip curled up on the canvas for a nine-second nap. In the second the negro leaned on him a little harder and the one-time pride of England went out like a lamp.

The stout-hearted Englishmen who surrounded the ringside were thoroughly disgusted with their favorite and proceeded to hand him the Whitechapel acclaim. Whether the impulsive Mr. Gaines will have any effect on the coming Empire conference we have no way of knowing. "Jim" Thomas, if he represents England at Ottawa next fall, may insist upon it as a condition precedent to negotiations that Canadian boxers in the future remain at home. It is a terrific blow to the pride of a fighting nation to have its favored fighter whipped by a colonial.
