SOME DISEASES OF SMALL FRUITS

(Experimental Farms Notes) The successful production of small fruits in Canada is governed largely by control of the diseases by which they are affected. Some of the most important diseases of small fruits belong to the virus group which includes mosaic and leaf curl of raspberries, and streak of black raspberries. Certain features are common to all of these diseases. An infected plant never recovers, and, if any part of a plant contracts a virus disease the entire bush will, through time, suffer from the disease.

Raspberry mosaic may be recognized from a distance because of the stunted nature of the affected canes, the sparse yellowish leaves and thin growth. The fruit is usually worthless, being dry and lacking in flavour. The large irregular puckered areas on the leaves of the young suckers is a constant feature of this disease.

In the case of raspberry leaf curl the leaves are abnormally dark green and the mid-ribs bend downwards, the leaf tissue is finely puckered and

the dwarfed suckers terminate in a yellowish stunted tip. The fruit, which is dry and seedy, is not worth harvesting.

Investigations conducted by the Federal Division of Botany have demonstrated that the control of raspberry mosaic and leaf curl begins with the planting of nursery stock free from disease. Plantations should be given three inspections and diseased plants, including the roots, must be dug out and removed from the field. Roguing is not recommended in plantations where the amount of disease is over 5 per cent.

An important raspberry disease which is caused by a fungus, is known as spur blight. It reduces the crop by destroying the fruit spurs and buds. The disease usually develops in July when the symptoms are indicated by the chocolate colored spots appearing on the canes at the base of the fruit spurs. These diseased areas measure from one to four inches in length and may girdle the cane. An important feature of this disease is that the infected area involves the buds, thereby causing its greatest injury, for it is to these buds that we look to produce the next year's crop. In the Report of the St. Catharines Laboratory for the year 1928 it is stated that spur blight may be controlled by spraying the plants with Bordeaux mixture, using 3 pounds of copper sulphate and 5 pounds of hydrated lime to 40 gallons of water in which had been dissolved 2 pounds of laundry soap. In addition, it has been observed in Prince Edward Island that the variety "Viking" remains comparatively free from this disease.

It would be impossible in a short article of this nature to discuss, separately, each disease of small fruits, important among which are the leaf spot and rust diseases of currants, gooseberry mildew, mosaic, root rot and leaf scorch of strawberry. Bear in mind that successful control of these diseases rests very largely upon prompt and thorough action on the part of the grower.
