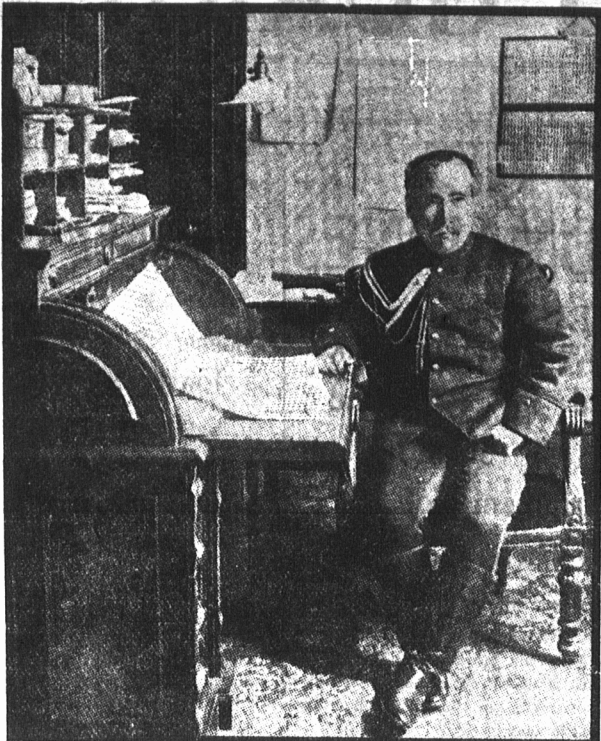

MAJOR GENERAL FUKUSHIMA.

Major General Fukushima has had the planning of the entire Port Arthur campaign to do, and has done so remarkably well. He must have studied every possible factor in military detail to have produced so marked success in each step to ward the inner fortification of the Russians stronghold. Fukushima was trained for his work by study in England and by several tours of inspection of military details in every part of the world. The fall of Port Arthur is now deemed certain by all unprejudiced experts, and certainly no mistake has been made in the final end of the Jap campaign against the key to the Northern Pacific coast line in the Far East.

THE SQUEEZING SYSTEM WEST.

SIR.—The squeezing system is a favorite expedient of the railway authorities. We have just experienced it in all its rigors here. Rubber is rather a stiff designation for the backbone of our people. We demanded a proper station here and the removal of the "Y" nuisance. The railway authorities were willing to give us a station like that palmed off on Tignish, which is certainly an insult to the place. We would have none of it. Better no station at all. We demanded one in brick, quite available here, or stone, equally near at hand. Finding we were in earnest, our demands were agreed to and the station is to be in concrete and stone and also of the dimensions we asked for. The "Y" we were told we must endure because \$20,000 would be required to buy the land for the contemplated deflected line into our depot. The Minister has again listened to the local railway officials. I could give him a deed of the necessary land for just one quarter of that amount. But that is not the worst. The station was to be put near the town and not out in the howling desert, complained of for a quarter of a century. The Board of Trade, even as your Board of Trade, fixed the site, when the squeezing began. First the Superintendent wrote a party who was supposed to hold Aberdeen in his pocket and who-e backbone was not dangerous just then and he thought everything would go his way. But it didn't. Then he took his private car up and went into conference with a few bell wethers of the party. He squeezed them so to speak and they relaxed under the pressure beautifully; and it was certainly amusing to hear the justification they offered for themselves and the placing of the station on the old site—where Mr. Sharp was bound it should be. Still there were enough independent citizens to talk the bargain and the Minister promised to do nothing till he viewed the ground himself and saw whether the "Y" could be removed

and which was the better station site. In Parliament the other day, however, I see he told Mr. Hackett that the "Y" was to remain as \$20,000 was to much to pay for expropriation. It is really too bad to have the public works of the country pulled here or there by a self interested, time-serving minority when there is no sane reason to offer for opposing the people's wishes. You have land to buy; the land is ours already. You are being balked by a narrow, selfish and short-sighted coterie, headed by officialdom. We are about in the same position: and if your backbone is not better stiffened that ours has proven to be, I fear for the result. I do hope, however that Hon. Mr. Emmerson's presence may change matters here ere the gross injustice contemplated by the local authorities is perpetrated. In any case do you locate your station where you want it regardless of anybody's pull. A. E. BURKE.

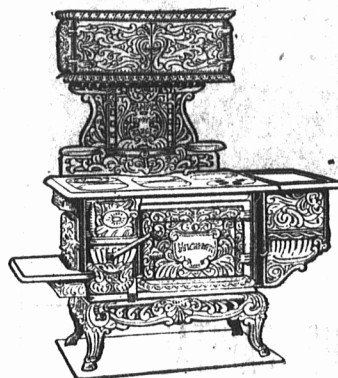

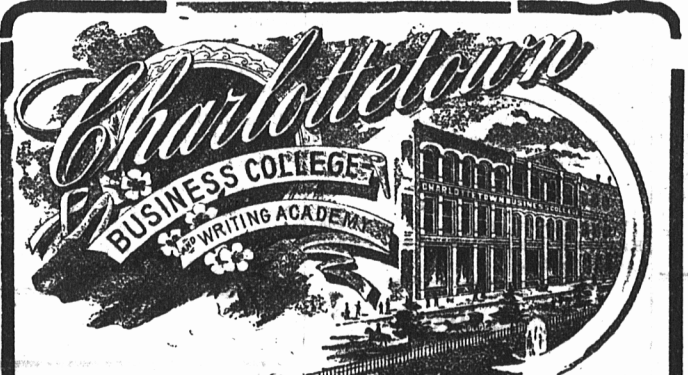
