## Dr. Black's Di missal From Immigration Department

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—An inspired announcement in government papers here, that Dr. W. J. Black is to be dismissed from the Deputy Ministry of Immigration, has a sinister significance. Dr. Black's steps taken by Canadians in retaliation for the war, as well as by the example of the United States, began substituting quality for quantity in his immigration and citizenship institutions, was welcome; and so was the citizen of any other country who wanted to go on the land. But fugitives from Central Europe, ignorant of Canadian laws, customs and institutions, and with a tendency to horde were discouraged and barred.

It is a notorious fact that the new regulations were flagrantly abused. Men and organizations leagued together and drove a "coach and four" through the Statute. A certain Montreal lawyer, he is now high in the councils of the present government, was the spear head of an organization which trafficked in foreign immigrants, at so many dollars per head, Poland, Roumania and Lithuania entered the Dominion by the thousands. Dr. Black, when he went to the Department of Immigration, waged war on this traffic. Assisted by Dr. Edwards, the new Minister of Immigration and Colonization, he barred a certain Montreal lawyer from the Department. He insisted that the regulations be applied with the utmost rigor and visited Europe to give special study to the problem which he had to deal.

In Europe, he found a serious situation. He found that, with the United States barring out Central Europeans, millions of Poles, Galicians, Lithuanians and Hungarians were looking toward Canada; that if they were permitted to enter Canada, the Dominion's cities would be over crowded, the standard of living impaired, the unemployment problem heightened a hundred fold. So he returned to his desk here in Ottawa more than ever determined to keep these foreigners out. He was doing splendid work for Canada, but he made enemies. He made enemies of the agents who were more interested in profits out of immigrants than in a whole immigration. And he made enemies of the Politicians, especially in Western provinces, who depend on the foreign vote. Today, and ever since Dec. 6, these influences have been calling for Black's head and, according to today's inspired report, they have won a complete victory.

The result, unquestionably, will be bad for Canada. If it had it will be may be gleaned from the statements of no less a witness than the Toronto Globe. The Globe, after an inquiry into the matter, described the situation as a "menace" to the social and economic life of Canada. It goes on to say: "The issue now lies between those who would have Canada develop haphazard by accepting all the polygot populations thrust upon it, and those who believe that the citizens of Canada should determine the character of those whom they desire, and take measures to induce them to come. The urgency of the problem is made manifest by the fact that the passporters of many recent immigrants to Canada here the kind that the man, to whom it

was issued, was not to be returned to the country which was exporting him. This manner of getting rid of undesirable has now been abandoned, owing to the steps taken by Canadians in retaliation to accept such passporters. Just now it is the policy to accept only the near relatives, such as father, mother, brother, sister or daughters of people already established in Canada. Even so, they still come in considerable numbers, and the arrivals would leap to five figures yearly if there were no measure at all. Strong as is this language, it apparently is not strong enough to save Dr. Black. The traffickers in foreigners at as high as a hundred dollars a head are "highly up" than the Globe.
