NEWSY FARM NOTES

A POOR HAY CROP?

Those districts which may be described as sandy loam regions are apparently set for a scanty hay crop. The cold rainy weather of the early spring delayed the starting of the grass, and now with the heat and draught there is not much development. The man with sufficient grain sown to give him a surplus for green feed is a wise husbandman this year. By the way, this condition of things corroborates the theory advanced by Prof. J. A. Clark, that a mild March, that is one that is above 28.5 degrees F., is followed by a light hay crop.

Cato an eminent Roman, said two thousand years ago, "Mow your hay in the proper season, and be cautious that you do not mow it too late." Sound advice and as applicable now as then.

The end and aim of all plants is to produce seed, consequently in the first part of their life they are accumulating a supply of matter and energy for the process. Once they have blossomed, these reserves are drawn upon and stored in the developing seed. It follows that the grasses and clovers are of the greatest value as forage just when the seed begins to form, during and immediately after blossoming.

When the seed is beginning to ripen, the stored up value rapidly decreases, and the palatability is impaired.

MILK SUBSTITUTES FOR PIGS

Skim milk and milk products are with reason considered to be the cheapest and best feeds for swine. Sometimes conditions arise in which the milk supply is scanty, and the

question is asked, are there efficient substitutes? There are substitutes but no equivalents.

The weaning period is a critical one with the little pig. Until the little pig is 10 or 12 weeks old his rations should be as free as possible from fibre, and contain if at all possible some skim milk.

Several years work at the Central Experimental Farm show (1) that milk fed pigs made the cheapest gains (2) that the addition of 10% oil meal to a meal and milk ration was an improvement, and (3) addition of tankage was a detriment.

Little pigs to be weaned without milk should be left with the sow as long as possible. At a month old they are given a small quantity of dry rolled in a trough in a creep, and this is later exchanged to a mixture of sif-

ed ground oats and middlings equal parts with oats the addition of 10% ground corn, and 10% oil meal. Or they may be started with an oatmeal gruel and gradually changed to a slop of middlings, ground oats and oil meal.

For the growing hog milk products cannot be entirely replaced, but pasture, green food, roots, vegetable refuse, oil meal, tankage and fish meal can be profitably used as partial substitutes.

THE HEN-HOUSE

When there are so many other things to be done one is liable to neglect cleaning up the hen-house. This should be attended to especially during the hot weather when the multiplication of the various external parasites, such as mites and lice, seriously affect the comfort and vitality of the flock. The dirt and litter should be removed, and if there is an earthen floor about six inches should be removed, and replaced by fresh earth. All moveable roosts, dropping boards and nest boxes should be taken out and well sprayed with kerosene emulsion, one of the best contact poisons for insect parasites, that we possess. Then while they are drying, spray the whole interior with the emulsion, and finish off with a coat of whitewash. A foot-pump is a great labor saver for both the kerosene emulsion and the white wash.

WELL WATER

In the months when the thermometer climbs beyond the 80 degrees mark, there is a great run on the water bucket. And these too, are the months when intestinal disturbances are most frequent, and it may easily be that one is the cause of the other. There is no more important and valuable asset on the farm than a safe supply of fresh water and he safest and best comes from the deep driven or drilled well. The shallow and improperly placed well should be abandoned, for it is too often the cause of outbreaks of typhoid, diarrhoea and other water-borne diseases.

One safeguard is to boil all water required for drinking purposes; this will kill any disease germs that may be present, but will not make the water a good one. Another method of purification is to add a half teaspoon of hypochlorite (chloride of lime), rubbed up with a little water to the barrel of water intended for domestic use. But no water can be recommended that has been contaminated by farmyard drainage, no matter what precautions are carried out.

P. E. Island Poultry Assn. Hold Meeting

A meeting of the P. E. I. Poultry Association was held in the Agricultural Hall, Charlottetown, June 4th. Pres. J. O. Hyndman, in the chair. The meeting was called to discuss the Poultry Show held in connection with the Provincial Exhibition.

Mr. Hyndman announced that the new building being erected by the exhibition authorities was nearing completion and will be in use for the exhibition held in August. This should stimulate a greater interest in poultry throughout the province, and it was felt by the members of the Association that the Exhibition Committee was deserving of much praise, therefore a vote of appreciation was moved and passed unanimously for the interest they have taken in furthering the interests of poultry in this province.

The Exhibition authorities have done their part in giving the poultrymen of this province a building which is suitable in every way for our poultrymen to show their poultry to the best advantage, and it now rests with the breeders to uphold their end, by making the 1929 show a banner one. This can be accomplished by a larger number of entries than heretofore, and a continuation of the same high quality of birds as shown in the past.

Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition being held in Halifax directly after the Charlottetown Show. It was stated that Nova Scotia farmers are paying more attention to farm poultry, and with a little advertising of Island stock, it might be possible to work up a trade in Nova Scotia for Island stock and hatching eggs. After considerable discussion the Association decided to send an exhibit to Halifax.

The last item of business was the question of Prince Edward Island stock being represented at the World's Poultry Congress, being held in London, England, in July, 1930.

The exhibit will be in the form of a live bird display. As the poultry of Prince Edward Island compares favorably with the poultry of the other provinces it was felt that this would be a great opportunity for the breeders of this province to advertise their stock in England, which might still further the sale of our stock. The consensus of opinion was favorable to the sending of an exhibit, but its adoption was left for a future meeting.

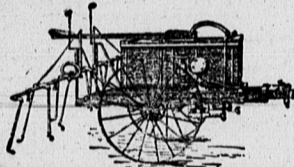

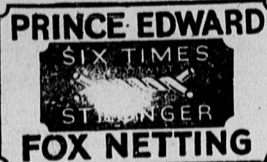
