JOHN F. BLANCHARD KILLED IN ACTION

The Sad News Received of This well-known Charlottetown Athlete's Death.

Mr. Clement Blanchard, 28 Kensington Road, last evening received a despatch stating that his son Gunner John F. Blanchard aged 26, of the 11th Siege Battery, had died of wounds on October 19th. Gunner Blanchard left here with the 8th Siege Battery and was wounded and gassed in July of last year. He returned to France as soon as possible after his recovery and took part in many of the heaviest battles since. His death was due to a gunshot wound in the head. There will be widespread regret among the many friends of this splendid young man upon his death. He was well and favorably known, especially in athletic circles, having been a prominent member of the Victoria Hockey Club and one of the Island's speediest cyclists having won many cups and medals in various athletic meets here. Before enlisting he was employed with the firm of Morris Smith and Beer. To his bereaved parents, and his brother, Captain James Blanchard of the C. A. D. C., Halifax, who is at present in Charlottetown, Frederick and one sister, Katie, at home, deepest sympathy is extended in their sad loss.

BIG SUBSCRIPTION FOR VICTORY LOAN

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—The first big subscription to the Victory Loan was announced last evening when Mr. Warren Soper of this city made public the subscription of the one million dollars by the Dunlop Tire and Rubber Co Limited of which he is president. PARIS, Oct. 27.—The official bulletin tonight says that French patrols have crossed the Danube River and invaded Roumania, near Lampaunka Bulgaria, defeating German detachments and taking many prisoners. French troops are aiding the Italians in their new offensive. According to reports reaching London today the attacks of the Allies are meeting with considerable success despite the unfavorable conditions. About 3000 prisoners have been taken since the assault was launched.

—KILLED IN ACTION—The sad news has been received in Miscouche that Pte. Frank Gaudet was killed in action in France on Oct. 1st, and Pte. Joseph Des Roches on the 5th; Pte. Gaudet enlisted in August 1914, and went over to France with the 105th Battalion.—L.

—WOUNDED IN BACK—Word has been received that Pte. Joseph Gallant of Summerside has been admitted to No. 56 General Hospital, Etaples, Oct. 11th, suffering with gun shot wounds in back. He is a son of Mr. P. C. Gallant and enlisted with the 105th Battalion.—L.

—DANGEROUSLY ILL.—Mr. Maxime Gallant, Summerside has received a message that his son Pte. Maxime B. Gallant who has been dangerously ill in the 53rd General Hospital at Boulogne, France, He enlisted with the 85th Kilties in New Brunswick and had only been in France a short time.—L.

—FUNERAL SERVICE.—The remains of the late George Deegan, who died in Toronto last week, were brought home to Summerside on Monday evening. The funeral took place from his mother's residence to St. Paul's Cemetery on Tuesday morning and was largely attended. The pall bearers were Messrs J. E. Dalton, Fred Murphy, Urban Gillis, Stanley Perry, Lloyd Sharp and H. Wash.—L.

—GOING TO OTTAWA.—Mr. J. T. Profit, Kensington, Secretary of the Provincial Dairy Association leaves the Province next Friday morning for Ottawa upon invitation of The Honourable T. A. Crerar, Minister of Agriculture to attend a Dominion Conference of Representatives of the Dairying Industry Co. to be held on Monday Nov. 4th, 5th and 6th.

—BOARD OF HEALTH.—Several cases of influenza having developed into pneumonia, a special meeting of Summerside Board of Health was held on Thursday evening when the following resolutions were unanimously passed:— "Resolved (1) Whereas owing to the increase of the epidemic known as Spanish Influenza within the province and that funerals of persons having died of this disease have been largely attended by the public, it is considered expedient by the Board in order to safeguard the public health that all public funerals shall be prohibited within this town and are hereby prohibited until further notice. (2) Whereas owing to the increase of Spanish Influenza epidemic within this province and for the purpose of further safeguarding the public health; Resolved that all stores and other places of business within the town of Summerside, excepting drug stores, butcher shops restaurants and hotels, be closed at 6 o'clock p. m. every day in the week, Saturdays included, from this date until further notice.—

KILLED IN ACTION

On Wednesday October 16th the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Gaudet, of Miscouche was saddened when a telegram was received announcing the death in action of Sgt. Frank Gaudet, M. M. He was one of the brave 1st contingent boys leaving Summerside in Aug. 1914 for Valcartier. Since then he was wounded once and apart from that was practically always on the firing line. After one of the heavy battles last spring he was awarded the military medal for bravery and a commission in England, and he remained there until a few weeks before his death when he begged to be sent back to his unit in France. He was not there long however when after four years service to his country he made the supreme sacrifice on Oct. 1st. He leaves to mourn his aged mother, three sisters Nettie at home, Mrs. J. E. Gaudet and Mrs. Beloni Gaudet, also five brothers; Wilfrid in Summerside, Gussie at home, Alex., in Quincy, Eddie and Alban, Miscouche, to whom much sympathy is extended.

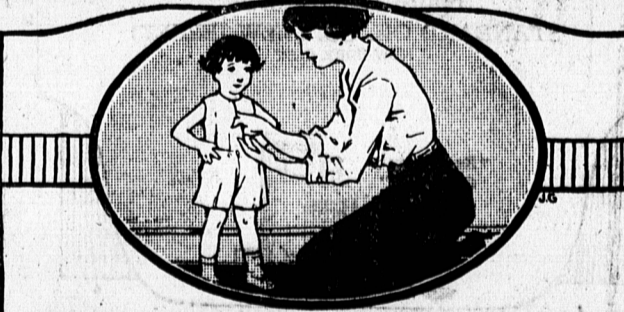
