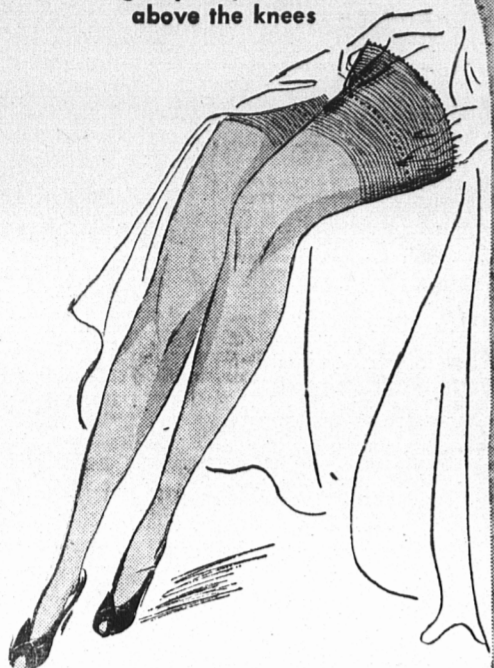

# Press Appeals For Queen's Fund

## Notable Editorials by Leading Daily Papers

Two outstanding editorials in support of the Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims are published by leading Canadian daily papers. The following is from the Winnipeg Free Press:—

"The smashing of Plymouth has attracted fresh attention; these past few days to the frightful suffering of the many thousands of civilians in Great Britain who are harried from shelter to shelter and finally driven into the open country by successive raids. Eventually places are found them all, places of relative security, but their belongings of all kinds are destroyed. The task of emergency feeding alone is difficult. The task of setting them up once more with some quantity of clothing and bedding is much more difficult. To meet these enormous and, alas, fast growing needs funds have been started in various parts of the world.

"Some months ago Mayor Queen made a formal appeal to the citizens of Winnipeg to do something for this purpose. The results have been good. About the same time the Toronto Telegram started a fund in that city which has also done good work. Now, that is the initiative of Mr. John G. McConnell, publisher of the Montreal Standard, newspapers right across Canada are sponsoring and endorsing this campaign for the world. It is hardly a large city in Canada where, one way or another, formal appeals for British air raid victims are not being made. Here in Winnipeg, rather than disturb the existing channel of contributions, the newspapers have stood aside in favor of Mayor Queen's fund. As the mayor himself has said, the channel is unimportant; the big thing is to get the money. And if they wish, send their contributions either to the mayor or to any branch of the Royal Trust Company which will forward them to headquarters.

### Her Majesty's Sympathy

"The importance of the effort the weight that is attached to it, is shown by the fact that Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, has permitted the use of her name in connection with the Dominion campaign, which is officially known as 'The Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims.' Her Majesty's sympathy for the stricken is familiar to everyone across the world; the photographs of that charming lady doing what she can to alleviate suffering and distress are known to us all.

"Day after day the King and Queen spend hours visiting the smashed areas, inspecting the arrangements made for the victims, offering whatever practical help and sympathy they can to the subjects of all of whom, as His Majesty has said, are in the front line. The scenes in that front line will grow much worse before they will get any better. Hard days of deepest anguish lie ahead. To give those people the assurance that, from our security on this side of the Atlantic, we are doing something to help will be a substantial token of comradeship that will play its part in the all-important maintenance of morale. An extract from a letter by a Manchester woman tells something of the need.

"It was pitiful to see the people trudging up the street with a few clothes thrown over their arms—clothes they had been able to save from their homes. A church school room was opened near here and two hundred were housed until somewhere could be found for them. And they had lost everything. A man who works with my husband had his wife and four children burgled under the house. They were digging for them all night. In another house by the month and yesterday, one seven months and the children were saved but the mother died two days later.

"These are a few of the tragic happenings that were heart-breaking. Homes ruined, and in some districts row after row of houses razed to the ground. It was really a dreadful sight. I stood in the street and wept thinking of the people who have lost all they had. It isn't war to kill people like that without giving them a chance to hit back. If we could hit back we would feel much better. I would gladly give anything to beat those devils. They came down and machine-gunned nurses who were tending the people who were hurt. We are inclined to blame Hitler for everything, but brutality must be bred in them when they do things like that. Thanks for your prayers and good wishes. We may need them here in England before we are through, but it will take more than Hitler to get us down!

"Every dollar contributed to the Queen's Canadian Fund goes without deduction to the Lord Mayor of London for distribution to the homes in need. The demands made upon us are many. We move from one great financial drive straight into the next. But this particular need is one that will continue until the Nazi air force can no longer fly over British skies; and so long as that need exists our common humanity will impel us to do something and to keep on giving until the last sufferers have been given the emergency help they so desperately need."

### Soldiers' Example

Another notable appeal is this editorial from the Windsor Star: "Over in Africa, British soldiers are giving the last ounce of their strength and courage, facing death every moment, fighting a war for the Empire. These men are doing everything and more than could be expected of them. They have, out of their meagre pay, contributed \$40,000 and sent it to the Lord Mayor's Fund for the relief of bomb victims in Britain.

"Over here there are millions of people who are living safe, comfortable lives, because those men in Africa, and other men on three blazing fronts, are fighting and dying. We face no imminent danger, we undergo no real hardship. Surely we can, out of our plenty, spare the money to help the bomb-shattered Motherland.

"The Queen's Canadian Fund is conducted in conjunction with the Lord Mayor's Fund. The money all goes to the same purposes. Her Majesty asks that we help. Your contribution is needed at once."

## One Million Pneumonia Tablets

One million tablets of a pneumonia medicine have been given to the Greek army by the British chemists who make it.

When the British Minister in Athens learned that the Greeks' supply had run short, he asked for £1,000 from the British Greek Relief Fund to make it good.

But the chemists would accept no money for their tablets. One million of them were accepted in person by the Duchess of Kent on behalf of Greece, her native land, and the first batch was put on a waiting aeroplane and flown off at once to Athens.
