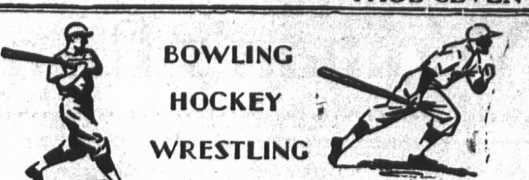

## Royals Extend Allan Cup Series By Turning Back 'Cats In Third Game 6-4

FORUM Montreal, April 20—Montreal Royals fought their way back into the Allan Cup picture tonight by defeating Port Arthur Bear Cats 6-4 in the third game of a best-of-five series for the championship. The Royals won the first two games, 6-5 and 3-1.

Heard by the return of their centre man, Eddy O'Connor, the Royals swept to victory on a goal scored by Pete Jokins in the 17th minute of the third period while defenceman Hugh O'Leary of the western team was in the penalty box. The Royals added another score in the last minute on a breakaway by Cy Allen.

Overwhelming favorite to end the series in three straight games and succeed to the title was the team by Trail Smoke Eaters, the team from the head of the Lakes found Royals a different proposition in the uniform.

The slender centre, spark plug of the Royals attack all season, suffered a shoulder injury in the eastern finals against Toronto Goddards that caused him to miss the first two games of the finals.

Although O'Connor failed to score, he seemed to add zest to the Montreal attack. Ken Murray was top goal getter for the Royals with two, one in the first period and the second in the middle session, while Gerry Heffernan and Pete Morin got singles besides Jokins and Allen.

The Port Arthur troops again were led by 150-pound Edgar Laprade, their 19-year-old centre man who paced Bear Cats to victory in the first two games. Laprade tallied twice, getting one in the second minute of play and the other late in the second period. Stan King and Joe MacArthur led the Royals.

Although Royals had the better of the play for the first two periods they needed good fortune to pull through with the victory, deserved as it was. The teams went into the third period tied at 4-4 and for the first 15 minutes of the last session the Bear Cats held the edge.

## Goshen Alive As Training Of Horses Begins

GOSHEN, N. Y., April 20—(AP)—This capital of the harness racing world is alive with the sights and sounds associated with Grand Circuit equine talent as the vanguard of the stables which have been training in the south swing back to their home quarters.

More than 100 trotters and pacers will arrive at Historic and Goodtime tracks here before the week ends in charge of trainers Billy Dickerson, Harry Whitney, Rube Parker, Harry Bowman and Fred Egan. Most of the horses, which have been trained at Orlando, Fla., and Aiken, S. C., since before Christmas will be worked over the mile track, while the rest will be stabled at the half-mile oval.

Prominent Hambletonian candidates will be among the invaders with Nibble Hanover, owned by Dunbar W. Boswick and his associates, Mrs. Ogden Phipps, both of Old Westbury, N. Y., leading in interest.

A three-year-old owned by R. Roland Earle, who is arriving soon to continue his workouts under the veteran Dickerson.

Goshen will launch Grand Circuit racing in the east this summer on a \$25,000 program July 3. After a month's sojourn in New England, the bigtime loop will return to Goshen and the mile track for a week of racing Aug. 7-12, with the Hambletonian Aug. 10.

## IN THIS CORNER

When Tom Claybourne and Mickey McMullen of Glouce Bay answer the opening gong tonight at the Sporting Club, fight fans are expected to be sitting in on what may be one of the most rugged fights ever witnessed in a local arena.

Both boys wound up their training campaigns yesterday and both reported fit and ready for the battle. There will be very little difference in the weight, McMullen being in at 147 and Claybourne, the Island boy at no higher than 148. Both have looked on a par in their training sessions and so much so that the betting gentry as yet has failed to disclose a favorite. The official weighing-in ceremony will take place at the Market Hall this morning at 10 o'clock.

McMullen, a boring-in, hard punching mitslinger from a country that is famous for its fighters, is well and favorably known throughout the Maritimes. Always giving of his best in action with a capital "A" every minute he is in the ring. He has an imposing string of knockouts to his credit and in any fight he may have lost, fans have always seen him go down battling.

Claybourne on the other hand is perhaps the smoothest, most workmanlike boxer in Island circles today. A southpaw stylist, the local fighter has invariably put up good performances. Always when the betting appears to favor his opponent, Claybourne has always come through with one of his best efforts and composing his list of victories are the names of some well-known fighters throughout the Island and Maritimes.

So you have a mixer facing a boy who is always cool under fire but who nevertheless can mix it plenty fast when the occasion warrants it. Claybourne is no mean puncher himself and if he is forced to go in and mix matters to the fight fans will see that he is plenty adept at this style also.

But the scrap should and will be a dandy. Both boys are set on punching out a victory and both will do so as quickly as possible. From the rival manager comes the word that they are confident of winning; both can't win but it should be plenty exciting watching just what will be returned the victor tonight.

The remainder of the card featuring Johnny Shaw and Kid Nickerson in semi-finals also promises action aplenty and the bout promises to be the best staged in a long while.

Winner of tonight's main event gets a crack at Johnny Nemo, veteran middleweight, campaigner still the damaging puncher he was when he was considered the outstanding boxer in the Maritimes.

Baseball is in the air now and still hockey creeps in now and again. Latest is that the Junior Royals and Senior Rangers will be banqueted at Old Spinn on Monday night. Milton Bell, genial proprietor will be host at the affair and the event promises to be an enjoyable one.

Junior baseball is beginning to be discussed quite freely these days that the consensus of opinion is that the Provincial League will be even better than the one in operation last year. At present there is only talk of two teams with the Royals and Royals taking part. The Royals evidently are taking the place of last year's Equines.

And if the rumor is correct these same Royals will be composed of pretty much the same players who made such a brilliant showing in this year's hockey playoffs, a season in which the Maritime title came within their grasp. Club executives think that the team can go just as far in baseball and defining word on the Royals' entry is expected within the next few days.

But when the chips were down in the ensuing world series there was an immediate turnaround that crushed the Cubs four straight.

The one flaw in the Yankee argument is at first base, where for a matter of 13 years there was no cause for anxiety at all. Time at last seem to have caught up with Lou Gehrig. With an iron will and an iron constitution the Iron Horse has been driving himself relentlessly all Spring towards what he hopes and believes will prove another complete season to add to his amazing record. But Gehrig hasn't been hitting, and his fielding has been woefully weak.

McCarthy refuses to express concern over his first baseman. Moreover he refuses to even suggest he take a rest. His idea is that if Gehrig finds that he can't stand up under the strain he'll ask for time out himself. Until then he will remain the Yankee first baseman.

## Schumacher In Trouble As Dodgers Take Giants 5-3; Yankees Blank Sox 2-0

NEW YORK, April 20—Brooklyn Dodgers took advantage of Hal Schumacher's wildness today to drop New York Giants and earn an even split in their first National Baseball League series of the season.

The Giant with the question-mark right arm worked six innings and was in trouble four, during which the Dodgers made good use of the big hits, the bases on balls and a wild pitch. Luke Hamlin scattered seven hits for Brooklyn, but one of them was a home run by Mel Ott with none out in the sixth.

At Boston, Philadelphia Phillies made only three hits off Lou Fette as the Sox chattered up a 2-0 shut-out and a sweep of the two-game series. Fette gave up nothing longer than a single and only first baseman Les Powers was able to go as far as third.

St. Louis was rained out at Pittsburgh, and the weather also ruled out the Cincinnati-Chicago game.

Led by R. Hennessey and Vern McDonald, who accounted for 35 points between them Friday, W.A.s basketball squad yesterday took a strange hold on the Island Intercollegiate hoop title as they raced to a 54-19 victory over St. Dunstan's University hoop team. ## Would Put More Color Into Hockey

NEW YORK, April 20—Frederic Rahr is a color engineer as well as a baseball fan. He is near-sighted. He has trouble keeping his eye on the ball. So he invented the yellow low baseball you read about. (And that's not all. Mr. Rahr thinks there should be color in hockey sticks and yellow on football uniforms. It's the visibility he has in mind.)

His bright yellow baseball, he says, will help thousands of fans with poor vision, and thereby help club owners and professional managers. The yellow ball will help batters because of its high visibility. It will help fielders and pitchers for the same reason. To hear Mr. Rahr, it should be a unanimous choice.

The yellow spheroid has become an official National League ball this year. Last year some college and professional leagues were played with it. Results of the games showed no startling amount of hitting, something perhaps to be expected from a ball of high visibility. The ball was used about what you would expect in a good average game.

Yellow was selected as the color of the new baseball because it is the color of the highest visibility. Red baseballs were tested but did not prove satisfactory.

Mr. Rahr is full of ideas about color.

"One place that I have to use color soon is on hockey sticks," he says. When a player is overtaken he could then tell who was who behind him by the color of the stick. Identification is one of the most important reasons for color."

Mr. Rahr has a color scheme for football uniforms. He would put bright colors on the backs of his team's uniforms, dark colors in front. The idea would be to encourage only your own team. Bright colors cause mental uplift, and give your team the old fighting spirit.

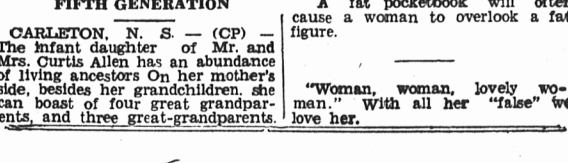
