Upper Canadian Stars Triumph In Tennis Finals

Nova Scotia Championships Conclude Sat. Only One Nova Scotian Successful In Winning Title.

 DNEY, N. S., Aug. 20—Ottawa and Montreal players made almost a clean sweep of Nova Scotia's 1933 tennis championships yesterday. Commander J. C. Edwards of Ottawa was crowned men's singles champion as he defeated Doug Grant of Halifax in straight sets, 6-4; 6-0; 6-1.

Mrs. H. L. Beer, Ottawa, captured the women's singles title by beating Mrs. Edwards, Ottawa, in three hard sets, 4-6; 6-3; 7-5.

Charlie Peters and Bob Barnard, Montreal, secured the men's doubles championship, taking a straight triumph from Eddie Condon of Ottawa and Hon. Peter Aitken of Liverpool, N. S.

The scores were 6-3; 6-2; 9-7.

Mrs. Harold Jones of Halifax was the only Nova Scotian to take a title, as she and Mrs. Edwards came through to defeat the Ottawa combination of Mrs. Beer and Miss Phyllis Rykert, for the women's doubles championship in two long duce sets, 8-6; 8-6.

Commander and Mrs. Edwards took the mixed doubles title back to Ottawa by trimming Bev Piers and Mrs. F. V. Woodbury, Halifax, 6-2; 6-1.

In the semi-final round of the men's doubles Condon and Aitken defeated Edwards and George

Christie of Bedford in four hard sets, 4-6; 11-9; 6-2; 6-1.

Calibre of the tennis played yesterday was, for the most part not up to that shown in the quarter and semi-final rounds. Intermittent showers made the courts very slippery and the players were unable to give their best.

NEW BRUNSWICK BOY WINNER HIGH HONORS

18-year-old Donald McLeod, St. John, Wins Grand Aggregate at Dominion Shoot.

 CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 20—(C.P.)—A slight, fair-haired lad who has just passed his 18th birthday tonight was carrying back to Saint John one of the highest honors of the great meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, which closed here Saturday.

He is Corporal R. Donald McLeod of the 7th Machine Gun Battalion, Saint John, winner of the grand aggregate in the "Canadian Blesley" over hundreds of the finest military shots in Canada. The Grand Aggregate is second only to the Bisley Aggregate itself as the most severe tests of consistent marksmanship in Canada.

EXCELLENT MARKSMANSHIP

McLeod went through six of the biggest individual shoots of the meeting to post an aggregate of 527 points out of a possible 545, a wonderful display of fine shooting, day in and day out. He finished four points ahead of Company Sgt. Major G. M. Emslie of Toronto, who was shooting in the Empire classic at Bisley before McLeod was born, and Lieut. Stephen Johnson of Calgary.

Young McLeod and Corporal T. W. Gregory, another phenomenal rifle shot for his age, are among the marksmen developed by Lieut. J. Neal Dow, of Saint John, Cadet Instructor there, and himself a fine shot who has represented Canada at Bisley more than once. McLeod, a most unassuming youngster, gives all the credit to Dow but Dow points out that McLeod and Gregory have given, and are giving, the most careful study to rifle shooting, which is a sport, and an art, and a mighty necessary thing in wartime, all in one.

Kirkwood Winner Of Canadian Open Golf Tournament

Tricky Royal York Club Course Proves Downfall Of Many Stars; Sumerville Leads Simon Pures

 TORONTO, Aug. 20—For the 15th successive year, Canada's major golf classic, the open championship, was journeying abroad secure in the grasp of an invading contender. The coveted crown tonight was worn on the sun-bronzed brow of none other than Joe Kirkwood, the great Australian trick shot master, who now makes his headquarters in Chicago. Leaving the rest of the field of 87 finalists staggering in his wake, the transplanted "Aussie" toured the nerve-racking Royal York course with a 72 hole total of 282 to win the first major title of his colorful career.

"Guess I was just lucky," Kirkwood said after he had posted his 69, which equalled the course record established by Horton Smith, the "Joplin Ghost" three years ago. Then when he was officially crowned ruler of Canadian golf-dom he remarked: "I'm the proudest man in the world now for I never thought I would succeed in winning the championship."

Sharing the runner-up honors was the dethroned champion, the bespectacled Cooper, and the stout-hearted Lex Robson, Toronto professional who wound up with 290. One stroke behind them storming Ralph Guldball, long-hitting Louis, Mo., youngster, who lost his chance for the United States open crown this year by failing to sink a four-foot putt on the home green.

Such noted stars as Sazanov, Diegel, Farrell and Horton Smith never seriously challenged Kirkwood's scores, winding up with scores ranging from 282 to 294. It discovered that the tricky course was far from a "set up" dropping strokes to par all too frequently over-familiarity with the dog traps and rough. Diegel and Smith particularly were victims of the hazards, each joining the "duffer" class on two of the toughest tests of the course, the 4th and 12th, where they respectively posted inluminous 8's.

To "Sandy" Ross Sumerville, London, Ont., wearer of the United States amateur crown, went the honor of leading the parade of simon pures. Consistent through the fairways, but losing many strokes on the greens, "Sandy" trotted in with a total count of 295, five strokes ahead of F. G. Hobbs, Toronto amateur.
