PROHIBITION DOINGS

Sir,—From time to time there are some items appearing in our local papers referring to the enforcement of the Prohibition Law. Some way or other this information seems either to be overlooked or neglected by some. For the benefit of those who are interested in our work this letter is written.

It will be of interest to know what the Prosecutors for the different counties are doing. Let me say here that all these officials at the present time are in a diligent mood. There may be several reasons for this, but however it is, some good work is being done.

Take for instance the work in Kings County for the month of September. Five convictions were gained and among these were some who had been able to elude the law for a long time. In fact the last case was only won because of the perseverance and diligence of the constable, and also because our Magistrate has some regard for the honour and dignity of his position.

One of the reassuring factors in the enforcing of the Law is the type of splendid manhood that now administers justice from the bench of Stipendiary Magistrate.

In Queens County also the Prosecutor is busy. This official here is contending against heavy odds. For instances in Charlottetown alone we have eight drugstores and two vendors.

By law these people are permitted to sell under certain restrictions. Of course it has already been proved that these limits have often been passed and prosecution and conviction have been the result. The most of our drunkenness however comes from other sources. There are beer dens, and joints, and haunts in the town that are a discredit to any respectable community. It is from these beer joints that most of the trouble comes from. This beer factor is one that has to be reckoned with without loss of time. Beer drinking is simply an introduction to something stronger and is an educative factor in the one who buys and also in him who sells. The Temperance forces have need to turn their attention to this phase of the problem at once.

The Prosecutor for Queens County has six prosecutions for September resulting in three convictions. One man that had carried on a demoralizing traffic for only a few weeks was completely driven out of town.

With this comes the work of the Prince County man. This official has as many as twelve cases on hand. Two cases which were tried resulted in convictions and the usual fine imposed. This prosecutor has had considerable success in the execution of searches. At present he has as many as six different persons searched for beer that is supposed to contain more than three per cent of alcohol.

Two or three officials have been busy trying to enforce the clause in the new amendments that deals with treating and drinking in public places. This is having a remarkable effect everywhere. We do not mean to say that this obnoxious habit is completely eliminated, but we do mean to say that this new law has had a wonderful effect. This might be questioned by some who attended two of the three public gatherings held at Georgetown this year. What we do say is that with these two exceptions the whole tone of our public gatherings has been changed.

The behaviour on the trains too is much better. From remarks made by strangers and from those who do considerable travelling, and from observation we are agreed that things are changed for the better. From the Railway men themselves come some remarkable statements. The Superintendent of the P. E. I. Railway said the other day that "during Exhibition week the railway men handled some forty-five or fifty per cent more passenger traffic than ever they did before in the same time and yet said this official I have not heard of even one pane of glass being broken."

The railway employees also say that there is not near so much of the rough horse play on the trains now that they had in former days. Indeed one of the Conductors who had charge of a big train coming from Town during Exhibition week said that he had never seen such a well behaved crowd come from Town before at this time.

These facts speak for themselves. It is possible that there may have been a good many infractions of the new law, but some today are exceedingly sorry that they were foolish enough to break it.

Since this "Treating Clause" came into force quite a number of prosecutions have taken place and quite a few have been convicted. These have come from different places on the Island and the result is better conducted. Because of these cases we believe we are having quieter trains, more harmonious and profitable public gatherings and we expect in the near future to have this habit completely eliminated from our midst.

One other thing and it is this from time to time the Prosecutors of the different Counties receive anonymous letters that are supposed to contain valuable information. Let it be distinctly understood from now that no
