White Feather Misplaced For British Women

LONDON, April 9.—(CP)—The "white feather" barrage which rained such a row during the first Great War has broken out again—but with a difference—this time the women are receiving the "white feather" stigma.

"Civvie-street girls are slacking," was the captioned article in a London paper which has caused a howl of indignation and a avalanche of protesting letters and messages to the writer, an A.T.S. (Auxiliary Territorial Service) sergeant. She wrote, "When I am asked to see other girls in 'civvies' still drinking afternoon tea, eating cakes and enjoying themselves in the cafes, they are volunteering nothing. It might be a good idea if these girls in 'civvie-street' be given white-feather."

White feathers have already been received by office girls in Essex towns with accompanying notes saying, "Join your sisters in uniform." Young girls who had been turned down as too young to be recruited into the voluntary service have also received white feathers.

Stenographers and government service girls who received feathers replied, "Yes, we do take tea in the cafes in the late afternoon. But we wonder if the A.T.S. sergeant knows that we work seven days a week, all through air raids and take our turns at first aid and fire watching service."

Another A.T.S. girl wrote that she'd like to meet the sergeant whose views she shared and suggested that perhaps a shield be added to the feathers for those whose wartime service is tea-drinking.

A Mother's View

Another reaction is expressed in a letter from the mother of two "Wrens" (Women's Royal Navy Service).

"I have two daughters in uniform but I venture to say that neither one of them is doing the work I am doing—without glory, uniform or pay either.

"They tell me that they are not finding enough to do. I cannot complain of that. I have my house and shop to look after, drive an ambulance, take my turn in A.R.P. work and fire watching."

The girl employees of another business organization write: "Are we to be called cowards and given white feathers? No, we don't wear khaki, but we work long hours where we do part-time shelter ser-

War Services Fund Reaches \$3,414,253

TORONTO, April—"I wish to address a renewed earnest appeal to the Canadian people and to the working members and canvassers belonging to our organization all over Canada," declared General A. D. MacRae, National Chairman of the Canadian War Services Fund in a statement at noon today. "On March 24th after a period of intensive preparation we have Canadians to subscribe \$5,500,000 for this Fund," he continued.

"As on Saturday noon, April 5th, we had collected in money and firm pledges \$3,414,253. These it should be made plain, are the audited figures reported to headquarters."

"This is a marvelous showing for a period of twelve days' actual canvassing. In drives of this sort the audited figures do not represent the full extent of contributions, and pledges made. Inevitably it means that there are many more thousands of dollars pledged to or in the hands of local and provincial committees and not yet nationally reported. Our showing is so very encouraging that now I ask our canvassers to renew their efforts, that they go forward with redoubled vigour, because all we need to push our great enterprise over the top is a whirlwind finish."

"The average dollar-amount of individual subscriptions is high; the number of people actually canvassed in many areas is mighty far from 100 per cent. There are very few people who do not actually want to contribute to this Fund. In many areas, by reason of weather and snow-bound roads, canvassing has not been developed to the full. Given a complete canvass this Fund will go well over its objective. I wish to make this final appeal. There will be no difficulty in reaching the objective if our canvassers will take a new toe-hold and go again to work. This is no reflection on the great work they have done; but with the goal so short a distance ahead and so easy of attainment if everybody does his and her part. I say to each canvasser who has not yet called on every household and every individual in his territory, 'Let us get busy and finish the work.'"

"Wherever canvassers have called they have found that through our newspapers publicity and the radio, the motion pictures and press, and through the great efforts of the churches, Canadians have been well informed and are exceptionally responsive to this Fund and its purposes."

"As Mr. Churchill has said, 'Let us then to the task'. The goal is only a little distance ahead — on and let's put it over!"

She was affiliated with the "Women's Institute" of Peter's Road, and while there had cultivated the acquaintance of a wide circle of respectable friends.

The funeral services were conducted on Sunday, the 9th, at the home and Church by her Pastor, the Rev. A. C. MacPhail. In the Church at 2:30 P. M. the Minister spoke to a large congregation of friends and neighbours of the deceased. His discourse was based on 1 Thess. 4:14.
