YACHT RACING AT FAIR

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 14.—The Panama Pacific Exposition Yachting regatta, which is to last a month, and for which preparations have been in progress for three years, opened today. Races of three classes of yachts were on the opening programme, the first event being a race for the gold cup sent by King George V. of England. Five boats were in this race and it was predicted before they started that the world's record in what is known as the "N" class, would be broken. The course is 14 miles.

THE GRANDMOTHER OF RUSSIAN EVOLUTION

ORANGE, N. J., Aug. 15.—Mme. Catherine Breshkovskaya, known to the world over many years ago as "The Grandmother of the Russian Revolution," now serving a life exile in Siberia, has been transferred to the far northern city of Yakoutsk, on the edge of the Arctic circle, according to a letter received from her by Miss Alice Stone Blackwell, and made public today.

Mme. Breshkovskaya is seventy-one years old, and is suffering from cataracts on both eyes, so that she cannot read. Her only recreation, she says, is sewing for a few hours a day. Her banishment to Yakoutsk, least desirable of all towns in Siberia, came at the end of eighteen months' solitary imprisonment at Irkutsk for trying to escape from Siberia, where she had been sent for life.

NEWFOUNDLAND REGIMENT SENT TO EGYPT.

ST JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 15.—Secretary Bonar Law wired Governor Davidson today that the first battalion, a Newfoundland regiment, had been ordered to Egypt. A reserve contingent five hundred strong now stationed at Ayr, Scotland, with a third company two hundred and fifty strong now training at St. John's, and a fourth company, soon to be recruited, will likely be formed into the second battalion and sent there also.

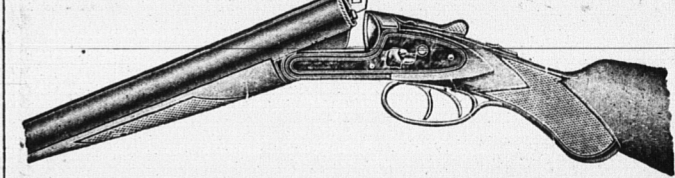
