CALMON, Ida., July 21 (U.P.) - The glory and importance that was once synonymous with Shoup, historic mining community, may return. Miners have discovered an eight-foot vein of quartz, which runs 87.30 per ton in gold. Alongside the vein is pyrite, which will yield \$20 per ton

Driven from pillar to post by the logic of their opponents and the enthusiastic applause with which the Conservative arguments were received, the Liberal candidates for the West River District ran amuck at the Clyde River meeting on Monday night and made some of the most astounding misstatements ever heard at a political meeting in the district.

Naturally the failure of Messrs. LePage and MacPhee, the Liberal candidates, to implement their prohibition pledges came in for strong denunciation. The efforts of these gentlemen to sidestep their responsibility were exposed to the contempt of the audience.

The Conservative platform enunciated by the Hon. J. D. Stewart in his key-note speech in Charlottetown was dealt with fully and convincingly by Messrs. L. W. Jenkins and D. F. Bethune, who were both in splendid form and kept up a continuous barrage under which their opponents squirmed and wriggled and at last found refuge in unimpaired abuse and exaggerated statements.

Mr. LePage denied that the Minister of Public Works had ordered \$20,000 worth of road machinery by telephone, despite the Minister's statement to this effect on the floor of the Legislature.

He claimed that Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan was going to be leader of the Conservative party and that if elected Dr. MacMillan "would break every law on the statute books."

Sneering reference to the increase of \$165,000 of subsidy obtained by the Hon. Mr. Stewart from Ottawa was made by Mr. LePage, who said the Province would have got this amount "if Joe O'Brien had gone to Ottawa."

Admitting extravagant expenditure on the McIntyre highway, he contended that another firm had offered to build a similar highway at \$10,000 a mile and that eventually the Lea Government was going to build them at a cost of only \$3,000. The cost of the McIntyre highway as shown by a report tabled in the last session of the Legislature, was over \$26,000 a mile.

Mr. LePage's wild statements did not pass unchallenged by the Conservative speakers, who scored point after point and received tremendous applause.

The meeting was capably presided over by Mr. James McPhail.
