## ROBBLEE GOES TO THE NORTHWEST

Mr. William C. Robblee, (son of Mr. T. H. Robblee of Tryon, P. E. I. and an old Summerside boy), general manager with the Daniel Hays company, left yesterday morning for Minneapolis, Minn., to accept a position with the Young-Quinlan company, an exclusive store in that city, says the morning Herald of Groversville and Johnston, N. Y., dated September 22th. Various Groversville friends will be gratified to know that Mr. Robblee, who has done much to place the Daniel Hays company on the high plane it holds today in the Glove world, will continue as the president of the corporation and James W. Green, Jr., the company's treasurer of this city, will assume the position of general manager. Mr. Green has been a director of the Daniel Hays company since 1917 and since that time has kept in close touch with the operation of the business.

Mr. Robblee came to Groversville from Cleveland, Ohio, in 1912, and under his guidance the Daniel Hays company has made notable factory building in West Fulton and steady progress. The company's street has been completely rebuilt until it is pointed to as one of the model glove factories of the American glove center today. The Daniel Hays company was one of the first glove concerns of this city to enter upon an extensive advertising campaign and one of the finest recommendations for printers' ink in connection with the building and enlargement of such enterprises lies in the well known fact that the present year's business of the Hays company has been steadily improving and increasing. The departure of Mr. Robblee from Groversville and connection with the American glove industry with which his well known activity and enterprise has naturally associated him with, causes resignation as a director of the Associated Glove Manufacturers of New York State, the National Association of Leather Glove Manufacturers, the Automobile Club of Fulton County, and the Groversville Chamber of Commerce. For two years Mr. Robblee was active in the interests of the local Chamber of Commerce in the doings and workings of which his forceful and aggressive personality was keenly evident.

Mr. Robblee served zealously and untriflingly as chairman of the Publicity committee of the last three Liberty Loan drives in Groversville and much of the success of these efforts was due to Mr. Robblee and his associates. In fact achieved by Chairman W. Elliott a marked measure to the deep interest and activity of the publicity head.
