The regular meeting of the Town Council was held last night with a full board present. The usual bye law fixing the rate of assessment was passed as follows: total value of personal property \$418,000, real estate \$885,070, total real and personal \$1,303,070; assessment on personal property and real estate \$1,819,02, poll tax assessment \$1,344.00 banks \$500, dogs \$87, total assessment \$9,750.02. The milk license question was again discussed. It was decided to leave the license as it is. On motion John Bates was allowed a rebate of \$4 on his milk license. It was decided to sell repairs to portions of west end of Water St. and Harvard St. East by public auction. It was decided, also to use the road machine on a number of streets. It was agreed that the Council meet this morning to inquire into the proposed encroachments on certain streets. The hall committee were allowed a sum not to exceed \$36 for making repairs to the interior of Market Hall. The clerk was ordered to notify truckmen that the bye-law respecting the dumping of garbage on the streets be enforced.
