entive was elected with a large majority and every district in the Province showed Conservative gains and Liberal losses.

Perhaps the greatest change was in Charlottetown where for the first time in many years the property holders returned a Conservative to the Local Legislature in the person of Dr. S. H. Jenkins by a majority of 340. Hon. Mr. Stewart's victory was a most sweeping one defeating Mr. Nash, his opponent, by a majority of 1068, the largest in local elections for a long time.

Liberal districts which turned over since the last local general election in 1908 were: Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Queen's, Second King's, and First and Second Prince's. First Queen's the seat won in 1908 by the late Hon. Matthew Smith this year went Conservative, as also did one seat in First King's which had been Liberal. Hon. John Richards' majority of 453 in 1908 fell to 165 yesterday and A. McWilliam's majority of 316 in 1908 was lowered to 49. The keenest fight was in the St. Peter's district between R. N. Cox and A. Simpson, returns received showing each to have 413 votes, exclusive of specials. In Queen's County the vote was heavier than in 1908 and every district showed Conservative gains.
