## ITALY REJOICES IN CELEBRATION OF INDEPENDENCE

ROME, March 25—Tomorrow, with the dedication of the eighth wonder of the world, a gigantic statue of Victor Emmanuel which has been under course of construction for the past twelve years and cost \$12,000,000. Italy will commence a celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the Italian Chambers proclamation of the country as an independent kingdom, which will last through an entire year and open to the world, exhibitions of art, science, agriculture and mechanics without a peer in the history of national expositions.

nearly a decade and is so closely connected with the building of the great monument to Italy's saviour, that to describe the events leading to the building of one must necessarily bring about a description of the other.

Just before the close of the nineteenth century an agitation was set on foot in Italy looking towards the erection of a memorial to Victor Emmanuel. The collection of the fund for this work met with instant success—the grateful populace from King to peasant contributing so willingly that millions were soon at the command of the promoters of the scheme and actual work was at once begun. It was also planned to hold an international exposition, or world's fair. In 1908 a national committee decided to make the unveiling of the statue and the celebration of Italy's independence one and for three years the people of Italy have labored with feverish energy to complete an exhibition worthy of the great events they were to commemorate.

Streets have been levelled, whole city quarters have been torn down, old palaces have been demolished or moved, car lines have been built, monster hotels have sprung up like mushrooms, and in the Piazza Colon-

### ONLY ONE MAN DROWNED ON BRUCE

SYDNEY, March 27—Another effort was made this afternoon by the officers of the Bruce to recover the mails and baggage still on the half submerged steamer. The Douglas H. Thomas went out about 2 o'clock and returned, bringing a quantity of mail and baggage, and three remains but little on board to secure. Manager Spracklin, of the Reid-Newsfoundland company, who is here today, said that the report that two men had been drowned was untrue, and that an investigation had shown that only one man perished, Pike, of Bay St. Lawrence had perished. Shea who was reported drowned, it turns out, has never been on the Bruce, at least his name could not be found on the list which has been recovered. Inquiry at Carboner, where the man is said to have come from, shows that no person of that name was known there.

The steamer Glencoe will arrive tomorrow and will have a wrecking outfit on board, and an effort will be made to pump out the steamer and if possible float her.

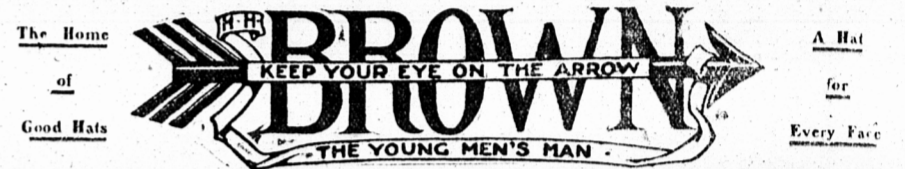

### THE SONS OF EXPEDITION.

Of late we have heard few breeding topics more frequently mentioned than the remarkable success which the sons of Expedition 2151, the great Electioneer stallion owned by Mr. Harry E. Hopper, of Indianapolis, are making as sires. This subject first became prominent two years ago when Fleming Boy 2071, by Expedition's son, Camara, was one of the reigning sensations, following in his (Camara's) wake being a number of others which if less notable were yet of the kind which refuse to be overlooked because of sheer merit.

This season, however, the showing of the family has been such that all previous ones have been entirely eclipsed. Of course the banner-bearer has been Expedition's wonderful granddaughter, Dudie Archdale 2061. As the winner of \$29,734.33, she leads all other money-winning trotters of 1910 by some \$10,000 or more. She also holds the season's record for a green mare and has been first or second in twelve of the thirteen races in which she has taken part, and third in the other one.

Dadie Archdale is a product of Nebraska. From far-distant California have come steady reports of the prowess of the get of another of Expedition's sons, Bon Voyage 3, 2127, a horse in his day a futurity winner as both a two and three-year-old. The Bon Voyage colts have built the stakes for youngsters there at both gates.

His trotting son Bon Guy has taken a record of 2:11 1/2 and has been pronounced the best racing three-year-old trotter ever seen of the Pacific Coast and much faster than his record. His pacing son Jean Valjean was invincible in the events for his age and gait and took a race record of 2:10. In the east Bon Vivant, another three-year-old son of Bon Voyage, has trotted to a record of 2:10 1/2.

From still another point of the compass—Tennessee—has come still another representative of the family. This is Empire Queen, by Expedition's son Empire Expedition. She has trotted to a record of 2:08 1/2 and shown herself a game and successful race mare in excellent company.

When such a group of instances as these can be assembled, it is very meaningful. Coming, as these performers do, from localities so far removed from each other, and owing their prominence purely to their own merits, they indicate a potency in their common ancestor which is rarely found in a trotting progenitor. This is not to be wondered at, for Expedition is not only a son of Electioneer—his dam, as is well known to breeders, was an own sister of Maid S. 2082. In the female line,

also, Expedition's blood is proving of extreme value. That world's record-holder, Jack Leyburn 2041, is from one of his daughters; so is that grand young western stallion Baron Reaper, 2:11 1/2 (2:12 1/2 on half-mile track), whose performances this season have disclosed his ability to beat 2:10 considerably.

As the generations succeed each other and the process of "survival of the fittest" proceeds, inevitably and inescapably, the channels through which descend the blood of even so mighty a family-founder as Electioneer will gradually narrow down to the few pre-eminent ones among his offspring. Among these the name of Expedition will, without doubt, rank as one of the foremost.

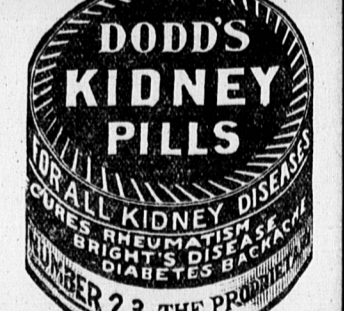
Expedition (2151) is the grand sire of the trotting stallion Aquiri, owned by J. M. Nicholson of this city.
