Prime Minister Mackenzie King has issued a timely statement through the Canadian Forestry Association, calling attention to the advent of dangerously dry conditions in the forest area throughout Canada.

In export trade alone, the product of the forests nets Canada \$300,000,000 annually in normal times. Undoubtedly in the post-war era there will be room for greater expansion.

Appreciating these post-war possibilities, the Canadian Forestry Association is advocating the setting up of a National Forest Congress Organization Committee to crystallize public opinion regarding ways and means of carrying Canada's forest policy into effect.

In the meantime, Prime Minister King's warning about the forest fire menace should be heeded. Even in this Province, where forest growth is comparatively small, the annual loss through fire is very considerable.

Our Post-War Exports

To what extent will the people of Britain continue to use Canadian farm products after the war? This interesting question is discussed by Mrs. W. J. Bryans in the August issue of Canadian Business.

Cheese is another food item which Canada has shipped to England in large quantities and with a proper follow-through promises a brighter future for the Canadian dairy industry.

This year Canada is planning for a total of 345,000,000 dozen eggs as compared with 200,000,000 dozen in an average pre-war year.

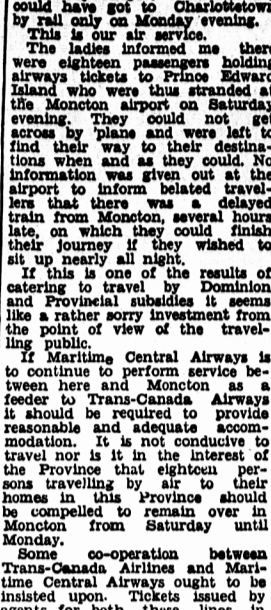

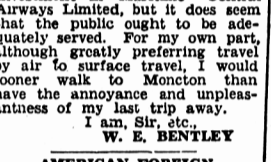
UNSATISFACTORY AIR SERVICE
