

WINDSOR SAID FINANCIALLY INDEPENDENT

King George VI And Neville Chamberlain Discuss Finances of Duke of Windsor.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—(CP)—Former King Edward's finances—which informed persons said need never worry him—were believed to have been the subject of a talk today between his brother, King George VI, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Neville Chamberlain.

PLANNING PROVISION

He lost that income with his throne, but King George was reported planning to provide him with \$125,000 annually from the Duke's profits.

Reliable informants asserted the Duke always would have enough money anyway to purchase whatever he wants.

RADIO ATTACK PROTESTS

The caustic radio attack on Edward by the Archbishop of Canterbury brought many letters to members of Parliament from their constituents.

Meanwhile it was learned that 10-year-old Princess Elizabeth, betrothed to the Duke of York, is being accorded full official recognition of her rank.

Italy Has Not Made Any Overtures To Insurgents For Balearic Islands, Claim

Pressing Problems Of Foreign Policy Dealt With By Eden In House Of Commons.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—(CP)—Pressing problems of foreign policy once again held the spotlight in the House of Commons today.

Prodded by questions from the floor, Foreign Secretary Eden made the following disclosures: "Italy has given verbal assurance it has not up to now negotiated with the Spanish Insurgents to obtain control of the Balearic Islands, and does not intend to do so in the future."

Eden confirmed reports of negotiations between France and the Basque Government for the exchange of prisoners under International Red Cross supervision.

Eden said the British Red Cross had sent neither men nor medical supplies to Spain, and had not recognized the status of private British ambulances sent there.

Asked if France's guarantee in the event of aggression against Great Britain also was applicable to the Irish Free State, Eden replied: "It is not for me to define the scope of the assurance given by the French Foreign Minister, but his statement, which I quoted Thursday last in reply to questions, refers to the defence of Great Britain."

Anglo-Canadian Trade Pact Under Review At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.—(CP)—Negotiations over revision of the Canada-United Kingdom trade agreement have not yet reached the stage where any indication may be given as to the conclusion of a new pact.

It is understood the agreement is a matter for discussion at each meeting of the Government with experts giving reports on the latest development in the negotiations which have been going on with the British Government since early last summer.

Maritimes & Confederation Is Theme Of Address

MONTREAL, Dec. 16.—(CP)—Dominion and provincial problems should be uppermost in the minds of good Canadians and should not be disregarded in face of pressing international affairs.

Dealing with "the Maritimes and Confederation" Mr. MacMillan said the Eastern Provinces made many sacrifices when they joined Confederation. The most important, he believed, was loss of trade with United States when reciprocal trade agreements were rescinded.

Maritime residents, he declared, were not inhospitable to the foreign born population of Canada, but said "we are too proud to listen to their many lies."

"We are proud to realize that we have done more than just produce lumber, fish, potatoes and fox-pelts," the speaker asserted.
