MAY NOT LAND

LONDON, May 5.—The Kemalists authorities at Inebolu, Asiatic Turkey have refused permission to Omar Farouk, son of Prince Abdul Medjid Effendi, heir presumptive to the Turkish throne, to land, says despatch to Reuters' Limited, from Constantinople. The Kemalists say they do not want any member of the Turkish imperial family in Anatolia. A Constantinople despatch last Saturday said Omar Farouk had escaped from Constantinople and fled to Angora. A letter written to his father, said Omar Farouk was unable to witness the invasion of the homeland by an "imperialist army," and added, "I am going to fight."
