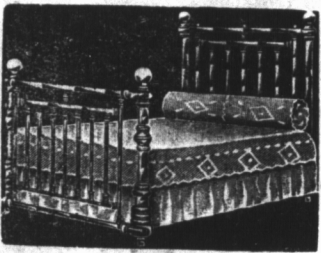

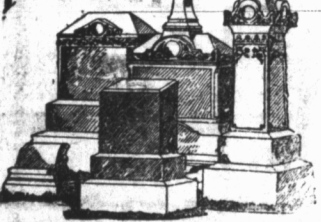

Mrs. SAMUEL DURANT, Margate, and her little daughter Ruth had a narrow escape from serious injury on Saturday morning, while driving into Summerside.

Their horse, frightened by the shunting engine at the east end crossing, bolted and ran up Water street. Mrs. Durant pluckily held on to the reins and tried to keep him on the centre of the street; but the animal could not be controlled and he ran against the sidewalk colliding with one of the approaches. The carriage was demolished and the horse broke clear, throwing Mrs. Durant out over the dashboard. She still held on and was dragged over the rough street about one hundred yards when the horse was stopped. Mrs. Durant was pretty badly bruised, one of her arms being cut somewhat severely; but she was able to walk with some assistance to Mrs. Seaman's where she was well cared for. Later she went to the Statheons Hotel and in the evening was able to go home. The little girl escaped without injury.

GREAT regret will be occasioned among a large circle of friends by the death in the P. E. I. Hospital last evening of Andrew Humphrey, of Kelvia Grove. The deceased suffered from appendicitis and came to the hospital three weeks ago for treatment. The case however proved too stubborn for the best medical skill and a wife and three small children are consequently bereft of a dear one. Mr. Humphrey was 39 years of age, years spent in honest, actual work. The pages of his life are clean, and sacred will long remain the memory of his kindly disposition. The community in which he lived has lost a good citizen, the family circle a good member. 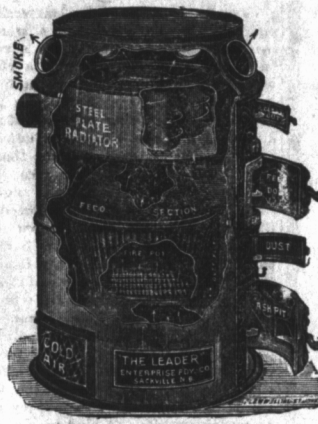
