Jewish People Mourn Balfour

JERUSALEM, Mar. 20—The Jewish communities throughout Palestine will cease work during the hour set for the funeral of Lord Balfour in Scotland. Schools will be dismissed and the teachers will tell the pupils of the place which the author of the Zionist declaration enjoys in history. A deputation representing the Zionist and the Jewish National Council today requested Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner for Palestine, to convey to the British Government the Jewish people's sorrow at the death of Lord Balfour.

Primo De Divera Is Laid To Rest

MADRID, Mar. 20—Primo De Rivera rests in a soldier's grave, honored by the highest tributes a nation can bestow. The man who ruled Spain as a Dictator for six years then went into exile, was placed beside the body of his wife in San Isidro Cemetery today, and rain soaked flowers tonight are piled high on the grave that was closed with the honors befitting a general in the army and a Premier in the civic establishment. A twenty-one gun salute rang from the distant hills, muffled drums rolled a dead march and army planes soared above as the cortege passed through the streets lined with infantry and cavalry.

Amendment To Coal Mine Bill Was Defeated

LONDON, Mar. 20—An amendment to the coal mine bill which at one time seemed might possibly cause the downfall of the MacDonald Government, was defeated in the House of Commons today 274 to 229. The Liberals abstained from voting and Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, Liberal leader, repeated a previous statement that their action was caused by a desire not to embarrass the Government during the present delicate naval negotiations.

Murdock Appointed to Senate

An announcement that caused a ripple of excitement was made by the Prime Minister that the Hon. James Murdock, a former Minister of Labor in the King Government, had been appointed to the Senate. He further intimated that announcement as to other new Senators would be made later on. News of Murdock's appointment came in the nature of a surprise. It is regarded as a gesture towards labor, but in the opinion of not a few on both sides of the house, it will not assist the Liberal cause in the coming election campaign to any material extent, if at all. Although Mr. Murdock has a residence in Ottawa, his headquarters as an executive of the railway brotherhood is in Cleveland and has been for years.

The liquor export bill was not reached this afternoon, as anticipated. A resolution on the pensions bill for reference to a special committee was debated instead. This would appear to be a work of supererogation as the committee on the bill is already sitting and sat this morning. Members of the Senate committee on the same question, have been invited to sit in with the members of the Commons committee. In order, as a number of returned men from various parts of Canada

BASEBALL AND THE GOSPEL

The American game of baseball was used last night by Dr. Robt. F. Whiston in his sermon at the Central Christian Church, to illustrate some high points of his message. He stated that the Apostle Paul used the Grecian race to make plain the truth and that was sufficient precedent to fall back upon for using baseball. A large canvas chart was used on which the baseball diamond was displayed, so that any who might not know the American game became conversant with its mean features before the evening was over. Dr. Whiston said, "When a man becomes a player in baseball he puts on a uniform and in a professional game no player is allowed on the diamond unless he wears a uniform, and he wears the same uniform throughout the game. Even so when a man becomes a Christian he puts on the uniform of faith in Christ as the Son of God and he wears this uniform throughout his Christian life. Faith is elemental and funda-

mental and from faith every Christian virtue springs. By faith he reaches first base in repentance for sin, by faith he reaches second base in confession of Christ with the mouth, by faith he makes third base in baptism and by faith he takes his place in the church so that ultimately he may make his way from third base to home plate and have his run counted." The speaker gave many analogies between baseball and the Christian life, showing that Christ was the umpire of life and gave His decisions according to the rules that govern the game in the New Testament. "Universalism Exposed" is the subject tonight and the Whistons will sing. This is no attack on any man's religious beliefs the Evangelist stated, but a striking exposition of a subject men are thinking about today. The service begins at 7.30 and closes by nine.
