D.S.C.R. to Announce Important Changes

(Special to the Guardian)
OTTAWA, July 5.—Important changes in the present regulations and the treatment of ex-service men are to be announced in a day or so by the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment. The necessary orders in council are in process of going through. It is stated that they will go a considerable distance towards meeting requests made at the Winnipeg convention of the Canada Legion.

It will be recalled that in the concluding days of the session of parliament there were many demands that propagation should not take place till these questions were attended to. What is now being done is by order in council in regard to matters which do not call for legislation.

One change is in regard to venereal cases. Where advanced symptoms develop, the department will now attend to the hospitalization of these cases. The ex-service men have long been stressing the necessity of this. Another provision is for indigents of soldiers homes, being cared for in hospitals when such treatment is required.

The latest basis of dental treatment is to be considered. Money is provided for "Last Post" funds where the local funds become exhausted, while these are the principal changes many minor ones are made. An official summary of the new regulations will shortly be issued.

New Altitude Record Claimed

WASHINGTON, July 6.—What is believed to be a new altitude record for airplanes was established here yesterday by Lieut. C. C. Champion, naval aviator, holder of the old record.

Flying a Weight Apache plane, Lieut. Champion soared to a point where his altimeter registered a height of 37,500 feet. His old mark was 32,000 feet. The instrument will be sent to the Bureau of Standards tomorrow for verification.

The Apache is a light fighting plane, carrying a Pratt and Whitney Wasp engine, capable of developing 450 horsepower.

BEATING THE CLOCK

LONDON, July 6.—Lord Burchley, the Cambridge University Athletic President, recently beat Trinity College clock by running round the Great Court whilst the clock was chiming the hour of noon.

The Trinity clock strikes the hour twice and takes exactly forty-seven and four-fifths seconds from first stroke to the last.

Lord Burchley started from the bottom of the Hall steps and completed the circuit of the Court just before the clock had completed the seventh stroke of the second chime. The area of Trinity Great Court is roughly 80 yards by 100 yards.

St. Walter Morley Fletcher accomplished the same feat about 35 years ago, and in addition he leaped up the Hall steps from the bottom to the top in one bound.

This clock was designed to serve both Trinity and St. John's, and a face overlooks each College. This was found satisfactory till an argument arose between the Dons of the two Colleges as to the ownership of the chimes. The argument grew so heated that it was forgotten that each would hear them, and the only solution to the difficulty which occurred to these learned gentlemen, was that the clock would strike once for each. This at noon and midnight the bell tolls 24 times.
