—Two assault cases alleged to have been committed at Wellington on Friday night last, preferred by two men named Raynor, both against Fred McAusland, come up for hearing before Stipendiary Wright tomorrow.

—Before Stipendiary Wright at Summerside yesterday a number of cases against fishermen for fishing quahaugs on oyster beds or on beds not staked off by the inspectors in Grand River were up for hearing, five of whom, Thos. Bagnall, Russell Cameron, Louis Birch, and David Bagalo, all of Lot 16, and John Whalen, of Lot 14 were each fined \$20 and costs or three months in jail. The cases against Walter and Augustin McNeill and Chas. Campbell were adjourned for further evidence.

TROUBLE BREWING.

BARCELONA, Spain, Oct 10—A state of increasing excitement reigns in Barcelona. The success of the revolution in Portugal appears to have emboldened since the furious outbreak a year ago.

There was the greatest animation in the streets today. The people pressed not to notice the patrol and civil guards which are being strengthened gradually in preparation for eventualities on October 13th—the anniversary of the execution of Professor Francisco Ferrera, the director of the modern school of Barcelona—who was convicted of having incited last year's revolutionary movement.

General Weyler, Captain-General of Catalonia admits that the strike of miners is taking on a revolutionary character. He says that his orders are to suppress any active disloyalty with a firm hand. Ten thousand stern faced miners marched to the cemetery in the suburbs yesterday and placed wreaths upon the tombs of Ferrera and the revolutionists Marcia, who also was executed, in consequence of what has come to be known as "Bloody Week."

Violent speeches were made by leaders of the miners who flayed the clericals, charging them with responsibility for the eye-dictions. A spectator who shouted "it was your fault as well as the clericals," was seized by the miners and had been beaten almost to death when he was rescued by the police. The military and police forced the manifestants to return to Barcelona in small groups.

LEFT EMPTY CASH BOXES AND PAPERS.

SALISBURY, N. B. Oct. 10.—The cash boxes and all of the papers stolen from the Crandall & Carter safe last week were found in an old barn a short distance below the village by Luther Haines on A. E. Trites' farm. The robbers had evidently met at the old barn after the burglary and divided up the cash, leaving all papers with the empty tills.

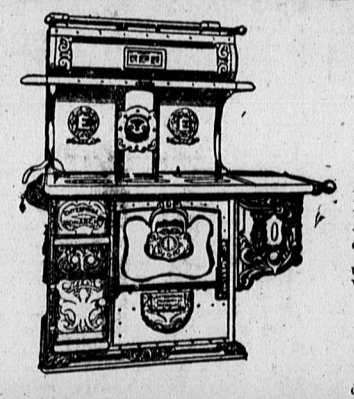
