AMHERST, Nov. 9—An added attraction to the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst this year will be the Silver Fox Show, the first of its kind to be held in conjunction with the Fair. A new building has been erected as part of the fair equipment, measuring 1 1/2 feet long and 40 feet wide. It is two stories in height and will be used to house the Fox Show and the Poultry Show.

Many breeders are showing their foxes at the Fair, among them being the winners in the various classes of the Fox Show at Charlottetown.

MORNING TRAIN CAUSES INCONVENIENCE—On Friday last the morning train from Charlottetown arrived at Summerside at 11.15 a. m., almost two hours behind the schedule time. Citizens complain that this is only a repetition of what has been going on for some time, and that it is a very considerable inconvenience to the business men of Summerside not to be able to get their mail before the noon hour, to say nothing of the tedious hours that passengers have to endure. This matter was taken up recently with Mr. McNutt, Superintendent for P.E.I., by members of the Board of Trade at Summerside and the authorities have promised to have the matter looked into. It has been suggested that a light train specially for passengers and mail should be allowed to run when heavy freight is moving.—S.

AT COURT HOUSE IN SUMMERSIDE on Saturday afternoon several adjourned cases were disposed of. A party for having liquor in his possession was fined \$200 and costs. A case occupied the Court for some hours, which had already been tried under the Customs Act before Mr. H. J. Massy and Mr. F. W. Cannon and dismissed as there was in their opinion insufficient evidence to prove that the liquor in question was in the possession of the parties accused. The case had to do with the seizure by the customs officers a short while ago of a keg of rum and jar containing liquor, which they found floating in the water near Grand River Wharf and which they stated was the same as they had seen in the defendant's boat earlier that same night. There were no prohibitions there at the time of the seizure and the Magistrate fined the owner of the boat \$200 and costs or three months.

Church Services
 TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

Remembrance and Thanksgiving were the subjects dealt with at the services yesterday. In the morning Rev. C. N. Brown took as his text Deut. 8-2, and delivered a most appropriate Armistice Day sermon paying eloquent tribute to those who laid down their lives in the Great War and also to those comrades who returned broken in body and spirit. We honor them. Let us see to it that nothing can tarnish their memory. Mr. Brown then reviewed the steps taken in the last 12 years in the interests of peace. The League of Nations, the Treaty on Disarmament, the pact of Locarno, the pact of Paris when 45 nations signed an agreement to outlaw war, and lastly the Conference of 1930. No other period in the history of man has been so fruitful in momentous events. There was a splendid congregation present. The choir sang the Anthem "Alpha and Omega" by Stainer.

In the evening Rev. Dr. Ramsay took as his text that royal Psalm the one hundredth. He pointed out that it contained an earnest summons, twice repeated, to praise and to give thanks to God. This summons is re-inforced by the reason for gratitude, first in God's choice of Israel as his people and His shepherding them through the years, secondly in the revelation of himself to them as good and not evil, full of loving kindness and faithfulness. So God has called Canada to nationhood and will guide, protect, nurture and ever remain faithful to us if we are loyal and obedient to him. The service was broadcast by CHCK. At the announcement period reference was made to the visit of the Moderator, Right Rev. Dr. Oliver of Saskatoon, who will speak tonight in the Church and it is anticipated there will be full attendance. Then on next Sunday the 66th Anniversary of the Church will be observed on which occasion Rev. Dr. Holmes of Fredericton, N. B., will be the preacher. A special musical programme is being prepared.
