Hall, Richmond Street, and on receiving the officer's approval the advertisements can then be inserted in The Charlottetown Guardian.

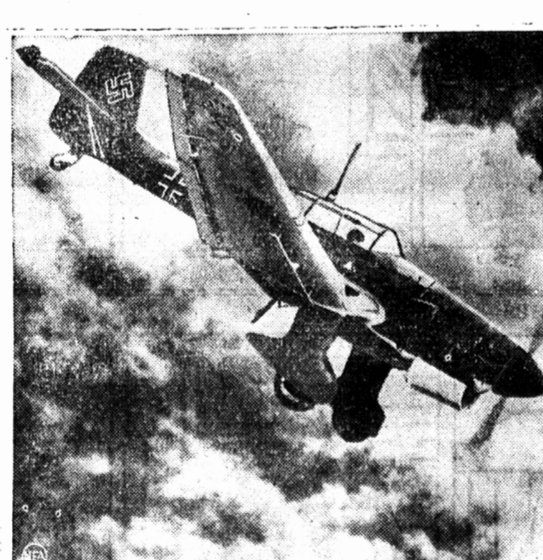

TRIPLE MYSTERY HOLDS WAR'S FATE IN 1943



CAN THE LUFTWAFFE KEEP IT UP? The German air force's strength and availability for a multi-front war is a mystery No. 1

WASHINGTON — The minds of United Nations strategists now are occupied by three vital and interrelated questions that are determining the course of the war.

If favorable answers can be found, the German army will be split, the Nazi Luftwaffe will not dominate the air, and Russia's resistance will continue with little abatement. In such cases, the projected invasion of Europe would not be a "second front," but actually a third. And surest of all, the war in 1943 would be America's war, in a mounting and encircling tide of men and metal.

Development which may not be divulged at this time are said to be pointing up the three current mysteries which are burdensome to United Nations leaders and especially to Americans who must strain across heart-breaking distances to help solve them. And what is said today, officially or unofficially, nobody knows the real answers.

FIRST MYSTERY is the Nazi air strength. Nobody really knows whether the Luftwaffe can simultaneously fight, a little or a lot, in Russia and the Near East, and still Britain by bombing or cover an invasion. Goering has just said it could not—but did Goering tell the truth, and if so, for how long?

American efforts are intensified to build up air strength, not only in Britain and the Near East, but in Russia. Japanese occupation of some of the Aleutian Islands failed to stop this.

SECOND MYSTERY is Russia's industrial strength. In spite of much high talk, nobody knows positively whether German conquests and bombing have left the U. S. S. R. enough raw materials and factories and tools to turn out

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400th R.C.A.F. Casualty List

(CP) — The Royal Canadian Air Force in its 400th casualty list of the war tonight announced two men were killed on active service overseas and two missing believed killed during air operations overseas.

One of those missing believed killed overseas was Wing Commander John Despard, 217 of Ottawa. Fifteen men were listed as missing after air operations overseas.

The list also named 15 men as missing on active service in Newfoundland. Eleven of them had been named previously as missing in the sinking of the Newfoundland Government Steamship Caribou, torpedoed between Nova Scotia and Newfoundland Oct. 14 with the loss of 137 lives.

The "Canada" section of the list named five men as missing after flying operations and one previously reported seriously ill now reported dangerously ill.

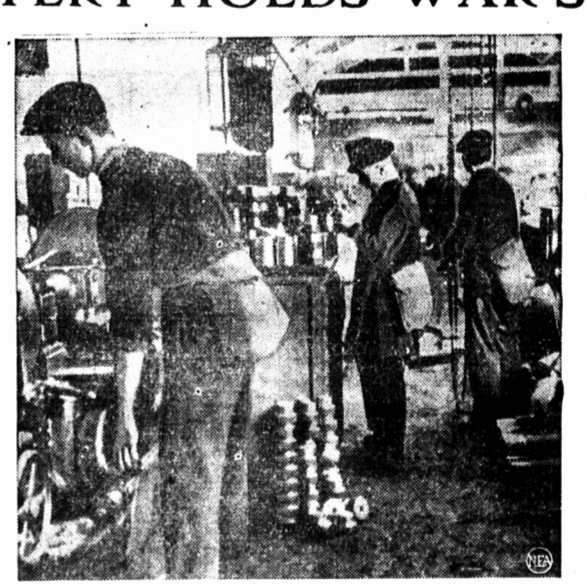

WHAT'S RUSSIA'S INDUSTRIAL CAPACITY?



WHY'LL GET THE JUMP IN THE NEAR EAST? American "Gen. Grant" tanks like these flock into this vital theater — and Rommel admits they are good.

Already Rommel has met U. S. tanks which he admits are good. Some had American crews. So have the American planes which always improving in quality and numbers, fly across the South Atlantic and Africa.

And tanks and planes are not all. Few Americans understand nearly the Near East is a major "second front" where an Allied offensive would directly support Russia and might reconquer the Balkans and eventually free Italy. In that Allied offensive, more than tanks, planes and their crews would be American.

Suppose a favorable solution can be found for the three phases—then what? By some time next year we may have abroad 4,000,000 men—almost twice as many as in 1918. We can make the equipment for them if, as now seems likely, we put into effect the industrial mobilization plan worked out in peacetime by our Army but hitherto adopted only by the Nazis.
