Dated this 14th day of July, A. D. 1906.

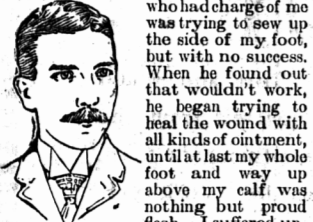

ASSOCIATION OF WESTERN TEACHERS

Thirtieth Annual Convention—Held At Kensington—A Splendid Meeting—Many Subjects Aply Treated and Discussed—Full Report of Proceedings.

CONCLUDED

The next number was a masterly paper on English Literature by Miss Annie Clark. In teaching English she gave the rules that should be followed. 1st. Correction of errors in Expression. 2nd. Cultivation of good form in writing. 3rd. Training pupils to appreciate and admire the best works of our greatest authors. In regard to the cultivation of good form in writing she stated that we should read the best works of standard English writers, as the study of literature is intimately connected with correct writing.

The Literature should be a guiding principle in cultivating high ideals. In conclusion she emphasized the great influence the teachers can exert in character building, and English helps to accomplish this as no people can boast of a nobler, truer and brighter language than the English. The paper was discussed by J. G. Bennett, who believed that pupils ought to be directed to appreciate standard authors, and recommended the establishment of School Libraries. A vote of thanks moved by P. F. Hughes and seconded by Miss Tanton was tendered Miss Clark for her excellent and practical paper. The session then adjourned.

FRIDAY MORNING.
The third session was opened at 10 a. m. The President called upon Inspector Matthews for his paper on English Composition, which was of a high quality and very practical. As an aid to correct

expression, he said that the teacher should correct the errors made by the pupil in responding to questions asked them. He stated that the development of fluency and originality on the part of the pupils was the main points to strive for, so that their compositions might express their individuality, which is the key to success in composition writing. He recommended letter writing and the introduction of a correspondence between pupils in the Island schools and those of other countries, and said he would be pleased to render assistance in the adoption of this innovation. The reading of good literature, he believed is the next essential and that every advanced pupil should become acquainted with two or three of our best English authors. A discussion followed in which several participated, and the sincere thanks of the meeting was tendered Mr. Matthews for his paper.

A paper on Tuberculosis was given by Dr. McEellan, in which he pointed out the prevalence of consumption, and stated that by taking precautions the ravages of the disease might be stopped. He suggested that there was no sanatorium, where consumption could be properly treated, and where there would be no danger of infection. His Majesty, King Edward, is interested in the disease. Lord Minto also was, as is our present Gov. General Earl Grey. Largely through his influence Canadian Societies are being formed to prevent the spread of Tuberculosis. The Doctor also gave many valuable suggestions in regard to precautions. In conclusion he expressed the hope that our government will soon see their way clear to establish a sanatorium, where patients can get a proper treatment. J. E. Wyatt, in a forcible address mentioned two pre-entatives for the spread of consumption; (1st) Sanatorium treatment which would alleviate the condition of the consumptives, (2nd) Reports to papers as to progress made in suppressing the disease. He said there were pamphlets issued dealing with causes and preventatives of Tuberculosis; that the
