NEW YORK, Oct. 7 —(AP)—The stock market today dissolved its October stalemate in a mild storm of selling which pushed down a wide list of leaders fractions to around 2 points.
Canadian stocks ranged fractions lower. Dome lost 1-4. International Nickel common 7-8. Walkers 5-8. Ford A 1-4 and Hollinger 1-8. Gainers were International Nickel Preferred up 1 5-8 points to 129 7-8 and Ford B up 1-8. Brazilian Traction, Lake Shore mines and Imperial Oil all were unchanged.
It was the steepest fall since April 18 and was attributed by brokers partly to fears that Hitler's recent claims of the Nazis' readiness to knock Russia out of the war might be in the way of realization. Reports of deep German thrusts in the Russian front did not sell well in speculative quarters but it was also argued by analysts that the market lately had become stale from its narrow and aimless churning and was due for some kind of readjustment.
The Associated Press 60-stock composite had a net decline of 6 1/2 of a point closing at 42.4. All major groups were down and industrials headed the procession with a loss of 8 of a point. Dealings amounted to 602,120 shares.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Oct. 7 —(CP)—There were 291 cattle, 407 sheep and lambs, 1,034 hogs and 559 calves for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today.
Prices on all classes of livestock were steady to firmly common to just medium cows and bulls. Common to medium quality butcher cows brought \$4.50 to \$6.25. Canners and cutters \$3.50 to \$4.25 mostly \$3.75 to \$4 and common bulls \$4.50 to \$5.75 mostly \$5 to \$5.50.
Veal calves ranged from \$9 to \$13 with one choice up to \$13.50. Drinkers were \$7 to \$8.50 and grassers \$5.75 to \$6.50, mostly \$6 to \$6.25.
Good ewes and wethers were \$11. Buck lambs and culs were discounted \$2 per hundredweight. Sheep were \$3.50 to \$7.
Hogs were mostly \$14.85 for B-1 dressed, \$11.25 for B-1 alive fed and watered and \$11.25 off trucks delivered. Grade "A" drew \$4 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$9 to \$10 live weight.

Montreal Exchange

MONTREAL, Oct. 7 —(CP)—Issues showed faltering tendencies and closed mostly at their lowest levels in trading today on the stock exchange. All group averages were down slightly.
Softer in industrials were electro-lux, with a drop of more than a point, and Canadian Industrial Alcohol, Massey-Harris (new), Dominion Coal Preferred, Cosco "B", Gypsum and International Bronze Powders. Losers in the paper section included St. Lawrence Corporation Preferred, Bathurst "A" and Howard Smith Common. Smith Preferred edged up a minor fraction.
Metals to sag were Hudson Bay Mining, International Nickel and Boliden while Hollinger was an exception and worked up a bit. In oils International Petroleum slipped but Imperial recovered an early loss.
In the losing column among utilities and transportation were Montreal Power, Brazilian, the Canada Steamship issues and C. P. R. strength was displayed among a few miscellaneous. Imperial Tobacco preferred was modestly higher as was Laura Secord. Tobacco common was in arrears.
Total sales: 15,800 shares; industrials, 9,300; mines, 6,300; bonds \$10,000.

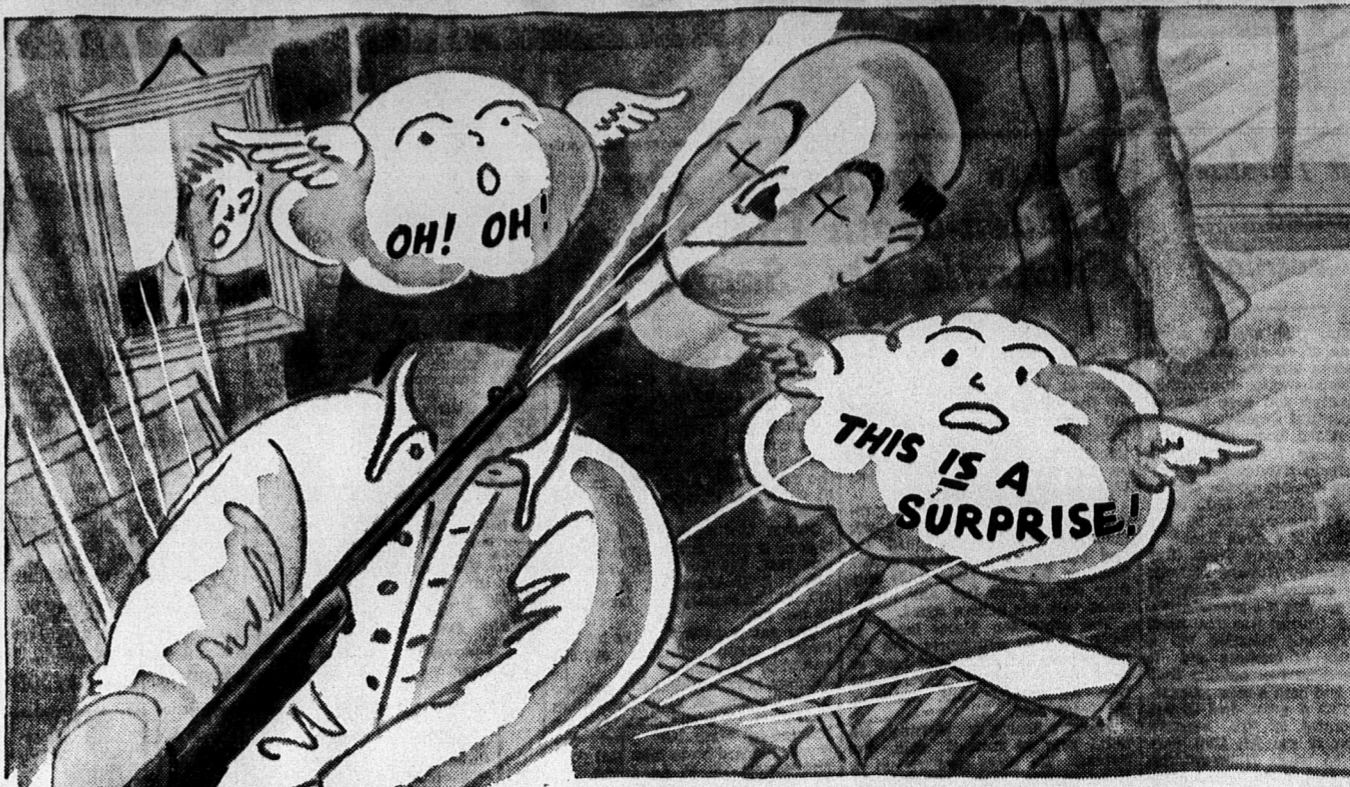

The publisher needs your help... because there could even be restrictions against our telling you about restrictions! So read your newspaper still more carefully. Keep an eye open for any non-military story that seems "doctored" at the source... or for significant news you know of that doesn't appear at all. Tell your neighbours! Write the editor!
We will keep that freedom if you prove you WANT it!

CHICAGO, Oct. 7 —(AP)—Prospects of clear, cooler weather more favorable for the harvesting caused a sharp break in the soybean market today with prices tumbling as much as 5 3-8 cents a bushel.
Wheat finished 1-1 1-4 lower than the previous close, December \$1.20 1-8-1-4, May \$1.24 7-8-3-4; corn 1 1-2-1 5-8 down, December 78 1-2-5-8, May 83 7-8-8-4; oats 3-8-5-8 off; soybeans 4 1-8-5 3-8 lower; rye 1 5-8-1 7-8 down and lard closed unchanged to 7 1-2 cents a 100 pounds lower.

SCOTCH SCONES WITH PEACHES

2 cups sifted flour
3 tablespoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons shortening
3 eggs
1-2 cup milk
2 tablespoons sugar
Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar together, cut in shortening. Beat 1 egg and 1 egg yolk and add to milk, stir into dry ingredients to make soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured surface and knead gently for 30 seconds. Roll out in circular shape to 1-2 inch thickness and cut into pie-shaped pieces. Brush tops with white of egg and sprinkle with the two tablespoons sugar. Bake in moderately hot oven (425 degrees F) for 12 to 15 minutes. Split and fill with fresh or canned sliced peaches, top with whipped cream. This makes 8 scones.
