Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

This sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, who has a certain section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Entries—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live in one house on the homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or certain conditions. A habitable house is required to be put where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader, in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$300 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years. Duties—\$100 per acre. Duties—\$100 per acre extra cultivated. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—\$100 per acre in each of three years, cultivation 50 acres and erect house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

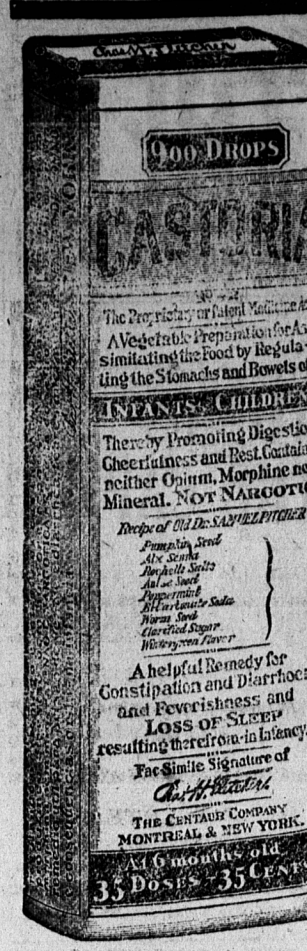
