VON STEUBEN'S GRAVE TO BE DEDICATED SOON

ALBANY, N. Y., June 16 (U. N.)—The burial place of General Baron von Steuben, German hero of the Revolutionary War, will be dedicated as a historic site on September 15.

The body of General Steuben who successfully organized the Continental Army that George Washington made him one of his most trusted aides, lies in a plot in the town of Steuben, Onondaga County. Its purchase as a memorial site was authorized by the state legislature last year.

Governor Roosevelt will be among those who will participate in the ceremonies.

Wm. Sampson's Pen In Lead

Notes on the Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest for the Week ending June 12, 1931.

Mr. William Sampson's B. R. pen 11 led the contest for the week with 58 eggs, 69.5 points; Mrs. J. F. Easton's W. L. pen 1 were second with 60 eggs, 64.6 points and Mr. Daniel Cantello's B. R. pen 18 were third with 58 eggs, 63.5 points.

Mr. William Sampson's D. R. hens numbers 5 and 8 are first and second in the contest for individual laying with 190 eggs, 218.5 points and 177 eggs, 201.9 points respectively; The Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, B. R. hen number 4 in pen 7 is third with 177 eggs, 201 points.

The pens leading in total production are:

1st, William Sampson, Durham Bridge, N.B., 1591 eggs, 1827 points.

2nd, Exp. Farm, Fredericton, N. B., 1517 eggs, 1661 points.

3rd, James Tuplin, New Annan, P. E. I., 1343 eggs, 1449.5 points.

4th, Mrs. Roland Easter, New Whiteside, P. E. I., 1285 eggs, 1388.9 points.

The production for the week was 928 and to date 23137 eggs.
