English Fans Want Numbers For Players

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, April 22.—Since Canadian hockey players introduced numbers to British sport there has been a growing agitation to have the idea extended to football. Those who suggested numbers for rugger players were not even answered. Nobody dared include cricket.

But champions of the move to avoid confusion finally found the ear of the soccer authorities. And when the suggestion was turned down for the cup final at Wembley April 30 between Preston North End and Huddersfield Town a hue and cry was raised.

Unbending English tradition didn't even bother to explain. The Football Association added a rule that each club would wear numbers because it wasn't necessary. "If a plebeian could be taken now of the \$5,000 who will see the match," Henry Rose in the Daily Express, "you can take it as certain that it would show something like a 100 per cent 'ja' in favor of numbering."
