Standard Pelt Needed Foxmen Are Advised

Necessity of growing a standard Prince Edward Island type of pelt of high quality, preferably aiming toward the three-quarter silver type with good necks, was believed to be one of the most important problems facing the fox industry in the province, was stated by Mr. J. R. MacLean, Prince Edward Island Fox Field Superintendent.

Other problems considered important by Mr. Burke, who addressed a meeting of the Surgoose Fox Study Club at Summerside Monday night, were lowered costs of production through co-operative purchasing, the feeding of fish, possibly the better and cheaper cereals, lowered freight rates, and using today's knowledge of nutrition to feed a scientifically balanced ration.

It was Mr. Burke's opinion it was of vital interest to the fox breeders of this province to have proper fish processing plants established here and thousands of dollars could be saved to the ranchers. In addition thousands of dollars could be given to fishermen instead of being sent out of the Province for expensive meats.

It will be recalled that in 1922-24 Dr. Allen experimented with fish feeding for foxes and with good results but ranchers never took the matter up to any extent until recently.

The year conditions in the fur trade were not good and prices of silver fox pelts seemed low, but it must be remembered that the quality of most of the pelts now on the market was also quite low and many that were shipped to Europe last December no doubt had gone further off color and possibly some had become dull through constant handling at the auction sales, said Mr. Burke.

The fact must be faced that there was only one way to make a profit in the fox business and that was by producing a superior article.

Several questions were asked in this connection by Mr. Timmer of the Prince Edward Island Fur Pool. He stated that within the last few weeks his firm had sold several pelts from \$50 to \$108 thus showing that in this type of pelt even today actually did bring a price.

Mr. Burke estimated that the bulk of pelts may not average \$20, but he was enthusiastic over the opportunity in this province for those who could produce the high types. He was equally pessimistic over the poor and medium quality furs.

The meeting went on record as to the necessity of a place in Prince Edward Island where ranchers could go in the event of a disease breaking out. Mr. Burke had referred to various services needed by the ranchers.

Other speakers included B. W. Robinson, A. MacNeil, L. W. Hancock, Frank Clark and E. H. Monkley.
