CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.

CHICAGO, June 8.—On weak cables wheat prices declined today 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 per bushel. Foreign enquiry after new crop winter wheat was the best for some time. There was likewise an excellent call for old crop wheat to go to the seaboard. Country offerings here were small. Auspicious field conditions put selling pressure on oats. Shipping call was good and included a fair amount for export.

WINNIPEG, June 8.—Owing to the frosts and weather conditions wheat rallied somewhat today. New crop sales for export were reported and weather conditions in certain sections were not all that could be desired. Locally oats and flax were strong on the damage anticipated by the frosts, especially on flax. All offerings were light. No export sales were reported.

TORONTO, June 8.—Grain markets continue to decline sharply. Cash prices were weak and lower at all points, with practically no local milling demand at present. Quotations are as follows: Ontario wheat No. 2 winter \$1.25 to \$1.27 outside, according to location; Manitoba wheat No. 2 northern \$1.34 to \$1.35 1/2.

MONTREAL, June 8.—A feature of the local grain trade today was the further demand from foreign buyers for oats, and as the prices bid were satisfactory sales of a few more loads were made. The feeling in the local market for Canadian western oats was stronger in sympathy with the higher prices in Winnipeg market and values advanced 1/4c per bushel, but prices for local grades were unchanged. The market on the whole is quiet with No. 3 Canadian western quoted at 60 1/2c, No. 1 feed at 59 1/2c and No. 2 white oats at 61c.

The trade is baled hay for local account continues fairly good, and supplies coming forward are ample to fill all requirements. The tone of the market is firm with sales of car lots of No. 1 hay at \$21 to \$21.50, extra No. 2 hay at \$20 to \$20.50 per ton extract.
